The last week was a lively one for the bowlers. In most of the big leagues the leaders were taken down to defeat by teams of lower standing. The scores were somewhat higher than during previous weeks of the season.

In the Omaha league K. Sciple broke the league record for individual total by rolling 74. The Old Style Lagers in the same league also rolled up a big team game, with 1,088. The Corey-McKenzies, Metz and Chris Lycks were high on the list with large team totals, and game, far over the 1,000 mark. The Booster leaguers topped the pins for high scores. In this league nine 600 totals were registered by the rollers. The Jetter's Old Age of the Commercial league was again on deck with big games and team totals.

The big drop came Thursday night when the Luxus, leaders of the Omaha league, dropped all three games to their closest rival, the Metz team. The Clara Belle, who lead the Booster league, also were pulled down a trifle by their closest competitor, the Chris Lyck team.

In the Magic City league the Martin's Tigers met defeat, but still have a big lead. The Storz Triumphs in the Gate City league were stopped by the tall-end Leary Engravers, and now only have a one-game lead for first place. The Brodegaard Crowns fared better in the Commercial league, and won two games in their series, and still lead the league.

The Pete Loch Juniors are leading in the Metropolitan league with the Droyda's Kenos team right at their heels. The Browning-King team heads the Knights of Columbus crowd. The Polarine Auto Oil team has the largest lead of all, with an eleven-game gap between first and second places. The Fairmont Creamery, Lithographers, Omaha Gas, Sunderland Bros., Clan Gordon and Paxton & Gallagher leagues are having close and exciting races.

Another noticeable feature of the last week is the large number of organized teams, not identified with the regular leagues, that have sprang into existence and are rolling match games with each other. The Sunderland Bros' league have placed an all-star team in the field to meet all comers. The Merchants National bank, Orchard & Wilhelm, Seldent-Breck, Droyda, Shoe company and the Standard Oil All-Stars are other all-star teams who are rolling regular match games.

City Tourney Improbable. Since the Booster league has announced the postponement of its tournament, there is considerable doubt whether the annual city bowling tournament will be held. Lack of organization among the leaguers, coupled with the fact that the tournament which begins next Sunday will be so late in the season, appear to indicate that the city tournament is improbable.

A number of the city's best rollers will be out of the city for a week at the international at Minneapolis. This tournament, following so closely upon the heels of the meet here, will likely give

the bowlers enough tourney experience to last until the season closes.

The officials of the Booster league insist, however, that it is not their intention to put a damper on arrangements for the city tournament. Several of them have said they are anxious to see it hold the same as usual. Their reason for promoting a league tournament—something new for Omaha—was merely to keep interest in the game alive, they say. In the meanwhile they are working to make the league meet a success.

Entries for the tournament must be in by Wednesday. The tournament will start at 2 p. m. next Sunday and will continue during the week. There will be matches every night. The five-man teams will roll first, then the doubles teams and the singles. Any five men may bowl as a team providing no more than three are in another team. The first game in the five-man team events will be the record from which all-events prize will be awarded.

Prizes are to be divided according to the usual tournament rule. The first place team will get 40 per cent, the second 30, the third 15, the fourth 10 and the fifth will get 5 per cent of the pot money. A number of local teams have entered and more are expected to enter this week. An effort is being made to get the good players from Benson to play at the tournament. The entries to date are:

While the Omaha bowlers are naturally more interested in the local tournaments, arrangements are continually going on for the international at Minneapolis, beginning February 11, and for getting the Midwest for Omaha in 1915. There is a possibility that the Old Style Lagers team, including Al Powell, Lynn Hammerstrom, Mose Yousem, Weatherich, Gus Toman, Ed Maurer and Joe Weeks may go to the international along with the Metz and Wroth's Cafe team. They have not yet entered.

The local members of the directorate of the Midwest Tournament association are leading a move to send nearly a score of teams from Omaha to the meet at Sioux City next year in an effort to get the tournament for Omaha in 1915. How to finance the various teams is being considered even at this early date. Should Omaha send a big representation, it is almost certain that the tournament will come here next. Sioux City, which received the support of the locals at St. Louis, will undoubtedly reciprocate, as will the teams from several other important cities.

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uation is rather unique. The undergrad-

Chancellor Avery, who is the Nebraska representative in the governing board, has received word from all of the Missouri valley schools, indicating that all of them would be represented at the conference. Dr. Hall, the president of the board, will speak Monday noon, at the Commercial club luncheon and other entertainments have been provided for the visitors.

RESCIND SUMMER BALL RULE

Secondary Schools of State Will Permit Athletes to Play.

UNIVERSITY PLACE TRACK MEET

Prof. Mann of Colner University Re-Elected President of Collegiate Association—"A.B." Rule is Construed.

LINCOLN, Jan. 17.—(Special Telegram.)—The Nebraska Collegiate association, comprising the secondary schools of the state, this evening rescinded the summer base ball rule prohibiting athletes to play summer base ball. The rule was passed two years ago and immediately met opposition. The committee of representatives thought its enforcement impracticable. The question on interpreting the "A. B." rule relative to a player's eligibility was construed to mean the completion of a four years' college course. Where athletes secure an "A. B." degree from colleges of less than four years' requirements it will not render them ineligible. The basket ball and base ball schedules were arranged and the annual conference track meet will be held in University Place on May 15.
