### GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Wheat Market on the Whole Reflects Dullness of Trade.

LIVERPOOL PIT IS VERY QUIET Cash Article Not Very Active Abroad, with Only Small Purchases of Australian Sur-

plus of Cereal.

OMAHA, Jan. 27, 1914.

The wheat market on the whole reflected the general dullness in the cash article yesterday, as only a few small icts were sold to interior millers, and bids from abroad, at Chicago, the seabeard and at the gulf were discouraging to biddera. Gulf ports offered wheat yia Antwerp at \$1.025, or only 9c over Chicago for No. 2 hard winter, which was much less than it could be offered from here, but this price was unattractive to foreigners. Liverpool reported the cash market there at a standstill, and while it was unchanged in price the futures were a shade lower. Importers must be able to purchase wheat cheaply in other countries, as Liverpool bought four cargoes of Australian and two cargoes of Hussian wheat yesterday, which le a general reflection of the actual conditions surrounding the Australian surplus, which for some time was said to have been partially purchased by Japan.

Conditions surrounding the wheat crop prospects in France doubtless changed over Sunday, as there were sharp losses in both wheat and flour there yesterday, and while it was in the cable that the weather was still cold it will be remembered that a promise of further imports were made bot, in Germany and France. Russia was offening wheat more cheaply and in large quintities, the Argentine weather was favorable for the movement of wheat and it was said the shipments from that country are to increase. The loss in corn for the day was \$475c, but at one time it looked as if it would be much greater, as there was considerable pressure. Local interests were heavy
