Coffee Market NEW YORK, Jan. 39.-COFFEE-The office market was lower in sympathy with easier European cables. Offorings may also have been encouraged by con-tinued large Brazilian receipts, but de-mand was so stack that it required noth-ing more than a few scattered selling orders to influence prices. The opening was dull at a decline of 2 to 3 points and the market closed steady at a net loss of 5 to 8 points. Sales were 16.750 bags, January, 8.16c; March, 9.20c; May, 9.47c; July 9.67c; September, 9.50c; Quet; Rio No, 7, 9%c; Santos No, 4, 12%c; mild, quet; Cordova, 10676c, nominal.

HOGS-Supplies were very light for a Friday, only seventy-five cars or 5,800 head being received. The total 'for the five days is 64.376 head, being about 4,000 head larger than last week, but a short-age of more than 12,000 head as compared with the corresponding days last year. Advices from other markets were en-couraging this morning, and the local trade opened in fair shape, shippers buy-ing some hogs early that were all of a dime higher. Fuckers were mow in start-ing and when they start bidding the prices offered were not over a nickel higher. Sellers were holding for a dime advance, and for a while it looked as though the packers would have to come to time, but they started by thair early bids, and when the otherings finally started to move, prices did not look to be much more than a nickel higher. To-day's trade was a good deal like Thurs-day's, in that the light and mixed hogs were the first to sell, and the more de-sirable heavy and butcher stuff failed to move early, and was not cleaned up until well along towards noon. This does not mean that killers prefer the light grades, but sellers were unaute to get what they wanted on the better kinds and consequently they held on to them and cashed the others. Generally speaking the market can be quoted as \$1000 higher.
