# GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Farmers Are Increasing Their Offerings of Cash Wheat.

EXPORT TRADE IS SHUT OFF Nothing Less Than a Sharp Decline in Grain Prices Will Induce the Foreign Purchasers to Get Busy.

OMAHA, Jan. 31, 1914.

The farmers of the country are generally well posted on the growing crops, and this fact was reflected not only yesterday, but for several previous days, by the increased offerings of wheat from not only Nebraska, but several other states, where it has been said all along that the surplus held was light. The interior holders of this grain have banked on the possibility of a crop scare and a consequent sharp upturn in wheat—both cash and futures. While we are just entering the month of February and there is a likelihood of much cooler weather, the prospects at the moment are ideal throughout the winter wheat belt, and there are few in the trade who are friendly to that cereal in consequence. The heads of some of the larger houses are advising their friends and customers to act with caution on the bull side of wheat at the present time, and it is well known that these people are always anxious OMAHA, Jan. 31, 1914. known that these people are always anxious to see a bull movement, as a bull market insures a much larger trade with sharp price fluctuations, than a slaking bear market.

bear market.

It will doubtless take a sharp loss in wheat to re-establish an export trade here, as the recent advance shut off all business between the United States and importing nations. Interior millers are taking only a small lot of wheat at Chicago, as it was said that they are now able to secure ample supplies at their mill doors. Another drawback to the cash wheat situation is the lack of demand for flour. Millers nere report the trade as confined to a few small lots, and
