WABASH FORECLOSURE DECREE IS FILED HERE

A decree of foreclosure in the suit of the Equitable Trust company of New York, trustees, against the Wabash Railroad company was filed in the office of the clerk of the United States district court here yesterday. The decree provides for the sale of all that property belonging to the Wabash Railroad company situated within the district of Nebraska.

The decree was filed here by John L. Webster. The suit, instituted in Missouri on February 7, 1912, was recently decided and Chester H. Krum of St. Louis has been appointed special master to make the sale. No bid of less than \$24,000 will be received, and all bids must be accompanied by cash or certified check for \$1,700,000 as earnest money. The sale will be made without appraisal. Coincident with the sale first refunding and extension mortgage bonds in the amount of \$40,000,000 will become due and payable at once.
