UNEMPLOYED JEWS OF CHICAGO MARCH TO CITY HALL

CHICAGO, Feb. 27 .- Four haudred men, most of them former Jewish garment workers, who have been out of employment because of the mild winter, marched to the city hall today. They were not permitted to enter the elevators to take them to the mayor's office, and after being driven out of the hall by the police, marched back to the West Side. At a meeting before starting to the city hall, the following resolution was adopted:

"We, the unemployed Jews of Chicago, comprising part of the army of 150,000 jobless men, demand a job." The resolution was mailed, they said, to President Wilson.
