### BELIEVE SMITH DEFAUDER

Authorities Arrest Man Who Sells Thousands of Wild Horses.

### CANNOT CATCH THE ANIMALS

Purchasers Go to Arizona, but the Brestes Are So Wary that They Slip Through Roundup Circles.

In the arrest of J. S. Smith by United States Marshal W. P. Warner, federal authorities believe that they will bring before the courts one of the most extensive and daring frauds ever discovered in this section of the country. Smith is held under bond of \$1,000 to face the charge of conspiracy to defraud, and his hearing will be before Commissioner Daniel Friday morning.

According to government officials, Smith sold bills of sale for horses alleged to be on the range in Coconino county, Arizona, when, as a matter of fact, Smith did not own the number of horses sold, and, furthermore, that the horses owned did not tally with the description of those sold.

How many thousands of these wild horses have been sold under this scheme has not yet been discovered, but it is known to have run well into the thousands.

Smith or the U. S. Live Stock company is said to have issued these contracts or bills of sale for a certain number of horses between the ages of 3 and 5 years and the purchaser was to go to Arizona and catch the horses, which were said to be very wild.

Deal Ends at Flagstaff. When the purchaser got to Flagstaff the bubble seemed to burst. True, there were some wild horses on the range there, but there were few people that would undertake to go out and catch them. In fact, when a party was organized for the capture of the wild horses no horses were caught, and after spending much time and money the victim of the fraud returned without his horses.

Many Nebraska and Iowa farmers have been defrauded out of large sums of money on these contracts, or bills of sale, for horses, and so far as the officials have been able to find out not one of the men who have held these contracts of sale have ever been able to catch any of the horses, and none of the many people who have journeyed to Flagstaff, Ariz., ever brought back any of the contracted animals purchased through these bills of sale.

Besides Smith, several other people are named in the complaint, arrests of whom are expected very soon.

A. O. Perry of Atkinson, Neb., was arrested upon a charge of implication in the scheme. He was released on a \$1,000 surety bond.

### Attorneys Have a Tussle for a Letter in the Clark Case

A physical encounter between opposing attorneys trying Mrs. Edith Hicks' \$100,000 slander suit against Albert A. Clark of Council Bluffs immediately after the noon recess of District Judge Estelle's court was the latest sensational development in a case in which counter charges of blackmail and conspiracy already had been made to the jury.

John O. Yeiser, representing the plaintiff, and W. J. Connell and W. H. Schurz of Council Bluffs for the defense, were the attorneys who provided the excitement and the cause was a letter which had been offered in evidence, but not yet read to the jury. Yeiser and Connell participated in a "tug-o-war" to determine who should have possession of the document. Connell secured considerably more than half the letter.

The letter was regarded by Mr. Connell as quite an important one and he claimed to have the lawful right to it and had the privilege to make the examination of it. He stated that if Mr. Yeiser had asked him for the letter he would willingly have handed it to him, but that he did not propose to have it taken by force.

### Boost for Hayward by N.Y. Dist. Attorney After Movie Stunt

From New York comes information that William Hayward, formerly active in Nebraska political circles, but removed to New York City two years ago, where for some time he has been on the staff of District Attorney Whitman, has been promoted to the position of assistant district attorney, which carries a salary of \$1,500. Mr. Hayward had charge of a recent successful prosecution against the purveyor of an immoral picture play for which the district attorney's office received much favorable comment. Hayward had the objectionable show reproduced in the court room, eliciting a prompt verdict of "guilty," from the jury.

### FREIGHT RATE ON CREOSOTE OIL IS ORDERED REDUCED

The freight rate on carload lots of creosote oil from Moline, Ill., to Omaha has been ordered reduced by the Interstate Commerce Commission in a recent decision. The present rate is 22 cents per hundred pounds. The commission has ordered it reduced to 16 1/2 cents. It was the George H. Lee company that last year filed the formal complaint with the commission that has now resulted in this reduction. The reduction, it is said, will mean a considerable saving to those engaged in the manufacture of certain stock dips, and others who use creosote oil. The traffic bureau of the Commercial club had charge of the case for the local people.

### Petition is Out to Secure Pardon for Frank E. Painter

While Frank E. Painter, local iron worker, convicted with twenty-five other members of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers on charges of complicity in dynamiting cases, offers to surrender and serve his two-year prison sentence, now that the United States supreme court has affirmed the decision of the lower court, many of his local friends are said to be circulating petitions to President Wilson asking that Painter be pardoned. He is now in Omaha.

"I am ready and willing to surrender and go to Leavenworth," Painter said to Secretary C. W. Shaffer of the Lion Bonding and Surety company. "But petitions for my pardon are being circulated, however, so there may yet be no need of my going to prison."

As there is yet no official order for his arrest or detention, the bonding company has not taken him into custody to turn over to United States Marshal Warner, who would accompany Painter to the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., should no pardon be granted. It is understood that in the face of the supreme court's action Monday, nothing but a pardon by the president can now save Painter and the other convicted iron workers from going to prison.
