**OUR FORTIETH YEAR**

**IRISH PLAN CELEBRATION**

Will Festively Observe St. Patrick's Birthday Next Tuesday.

**PROGRAM AT CREIGHTON UNI**

Prominent Speakers Will Address Gathering, and There Will Be Music and Other Entertaining Features.

St. Patrick's birthday will be festively celebrated next Tuesday evening at Creighton auditorium, Twenty-fifth and California streets. The green and gold of the flag of Erin will mingle with the folds of the Stars and Stripes of the United States on what is pre-eminently the Irishman's day in this and every other land to which Irish have drifted.

Previous to the year A. D. 466 the Irish people, although having attained to a civilization unsurpassed, was yet wholly pagan, and addicted to a peculiar form of Druidism, including sun worship. To this form of worship is attributed by some historians the presence of the famous round towers for which Ireland is noted, and they maintain that here the Druid priest ascended before the dawn and called to his followers to come forth and do homage to the rising god. Whether or not human sacrifices were offered up to appease the wrath of Druidical gods at certain seasons of the year, or upon the occurrence of events of evil portent, is a question of much debate, and conjecture, although it is not improbable that such was the case.

However this may have been, it is well known that with the advent of St. Patrick paganism and all things pertaining thereto became at once a thing of the past, and no nation in the world was more prompt in the acceptance or more firm and enduring in their adherence to the doctrines and precepts of Christianity than the Irish people.

**Occasion for Gratitude.**

The Irish people now feel that the occasion is at hand for gratitude and self-congratulation, for the future appears more bright than at any time since the fall of the Irish Parliament and the re-establishment of the union in the year 1800, when the cause for which Henry Grattan had given the best of his life seemed forever lost. The first step in the deliverance of the people was accomplished, and then largely through the instrumentalities of Grattan, in the year 1829, when the Catholic emancipation bill was passed in London, and the sword fell from the hand of the stone statue of Bishop Walker which had been erected in effigy upon the ramparts of Vinegar hill, in County Wicklow, where the Irish patriots had made their last stand at the close of the rebellion of 1798, and where the venerable bishop had fought and died beside his people in that struggle.

**Home Rule is at Hand.**

Home rule, a separate legislative body for Ireland, is again at hand, and with this accomplished it will but require the passage of time, the evolution of nations and the slow but inevitable righting of long established wrongs to achieve that purpose for which Robert Emmet gave up his life in Dublin, when his epitaph in accordance with his wishes may be written in shining characters, for his country shall have taken its place among the nations of the world.

Centuries ago when in Ireland the practice of the Irishman's faith was made a felony by his oppressor, and when the ministry of that faith became the special object of the wrath of the invader and persecutor, and the clergyman could proceed from place to place only under cover of a disguise, the spirit which has existed throughout the years and now numbers in its ranks the first and foremost Irish citizens everywhere.

**Ancient Order of Hibernians.**

That society is the Ancient Order of Hibernians, which maintains a flourishing division in Omaha, another in South Omaha, as well as divisions in Lincoln and Columbus. This is an exclusively Catholic society and may be said to be exclusively Irish, admitting to membership only those who are Irish either by birth or descent. It is represented in every city of any note from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and its numbers in the United States and Canada are in the millions. Its membership is constantly increasing in the United States, particularly during the last five years. Its object is the material welfare, uplift and betterment of the Irish race in America, as well as the preservation of Irish history.


Not many years ago the order appropriated \$50,000 for the establishment of a chair of Irish language and history at the Catholic university at Washington, D. C. James J. Reagan of St. Paul, Minn., is the present national president of the order. Mayor Thomas Maloney of Council Bluffs is national treasurer, and Archbishop Carroll of Helena, Mont., is national chaplain of the order. National conventions are held every two years.

**In Nebraska Forty Years.**

Forty years ago the order was first established in Nebraska enumerating among its local charter members Richard O'Keefe, Michael Hogan, P. J. Murphy, William McQuade and a host of others who are still active members and an honor to the organization. Dr. T. R. Mullen of this city served two terms as state president. The present state president is Rev. Michael A. Shine of Plattsmouth, who is also a member of the Nebraska Historical society and is known throughout the United States as a scholar and historian. Michael Crow of South Omaha is state treasurer.

One of the regular duties and obligations of the Ancient Order of Hibernians is the observance in a befitting manner of the feast of St. Patrick which occurs on March 17, and under the auspices of the order that day is celebrated wherever

two or more Irishmen are gathered together. A committee composed of Dr. W. J. Leary, L. J. Toepel and James P. Savage have been at work upon the local program since the first of the year and now have arrangements completed for an evening's entertainment that will deserve the patronage of every Irishman and Irishwoman in Omaha.

**Good Orators to Speak.**

Edward Whelan of O'Neill, Neb., will be the principal speaker of the evening. Mr. Whelan is well known to many Irishmen in Omaha.

The Creighton university orchestra will play appropriate musical selections during the evening. The program will be supplemented by the University Glee club, a quartet and several solo and musical numbers, including the Irish harp, without which no program on St. Patrick's day would be complete. No effort is being spared by those in charge to make this event conform to those of other years.

**Benson to Have Its Spring Primaries Monday Afternoon**

Benson will hold its spring primaries to place in nomination candidates for mayor, city clerk, city engineer, city treasurer, councilmen from the First and Second wards, and three members of the Board of Education Monday, March 15, between the hours of 12 noon and 9 o'clock in the evening.

Two candidates seek nomination at the hands of the republicans for mayor. Fred A. Bailey is opposing Edward Sorenson, and the contest is proving interesting, as both candidates have strong following. On the democratic ticket George A. Hill, present mayor, will be nominated without opposition.

W. E. Yorton seeks the nomination for councilman from the First ward on the republican ticket, and is opposed by Andrew McCormick at the primaries.

F. S. King, president of the board, is seeking re-election, and a battle royal between him and A. J. Sterrett is looked for.

The voting place for the First ward will be at the city hall and for the Second ward at the main street.

Five delegates will be elected from each ward, who will meet in convention Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock at the city hall to canvass the returns.

The election will be held April 7.
