

PROPERTY OWNERS WIN OUT

Expose Trick of Paving Promoter to Switch Kind of Material.

COUNCIL HOLDS WITH THEM

Are Told to Prepare Their Own Petition Stating the Kind of Material They Prefer and to Ignore the Promoter.

Thomas S. Crocker, professional paving material promoter, was tripped up in a sly attempt to shift materials for the paving of Forty-first street from Hamilton to Nicholas, when property owners appeared before the city council yesterday morning and exposed the trick.

Every owner desired asphalt and signed a petition circulated by Crocker with the intention of specifying asphalt. The petition went before the city council, passing its first and second readings and was up for third reading when, by the nearest accident, these property owners discovered that instead of calling for asphalt, it called for "asphaltic concrete," a material they knew nothing about. They got busy and made out seven affidavits, which they filed with the council last week, setting forth the facts. The council gave them a hearing this morning.

Thron of the property owners, George T. Lindber, Joseph P. Cleland and James T. Woolan, were present, as was also the professional promoter—up to the time the case was taken up—when he quietly left the chamber.

Mr. Woolan presented the case briefly. "The facts are there," he said. "We all are united for asphalt. We have been insistent on asphalt from the start and nothing but asphalt. We were particularly averse to brick, not wanting it on a residential street. I think, perhaps, it was probably our vigilance against the brick that enabled the promoter to slip in this other material, which up to this time most of us never heard of."

"This man, Crocker, accompanied by G. W. Hill, an attorney, I suppose—came around with the petition, which we were specifically given to understand called for asphalt, and we as clearly told him we

wanted and would stand for nothing but asphalt.

"Now, as to how he managed to slip one over on us is another matter. That, I suppose, is a trick of the trade. But all we ask of you gentlemen is that we be given the material we want and not what some professional promoter or contractor wants us to have. It is simply a matter of common honesty and justice."

The council saw it that way and without hesitation annulled the faked petition and advised the property owners to proceed with another one, which will be circulated by them and not a promoter.

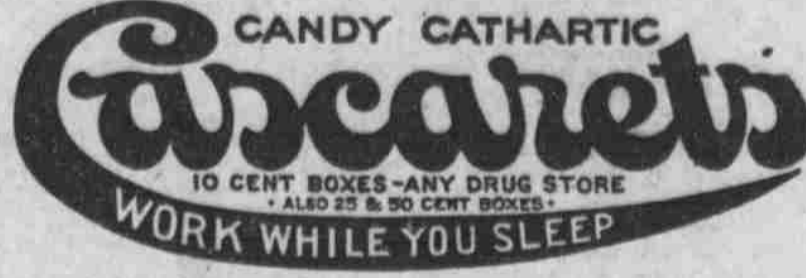

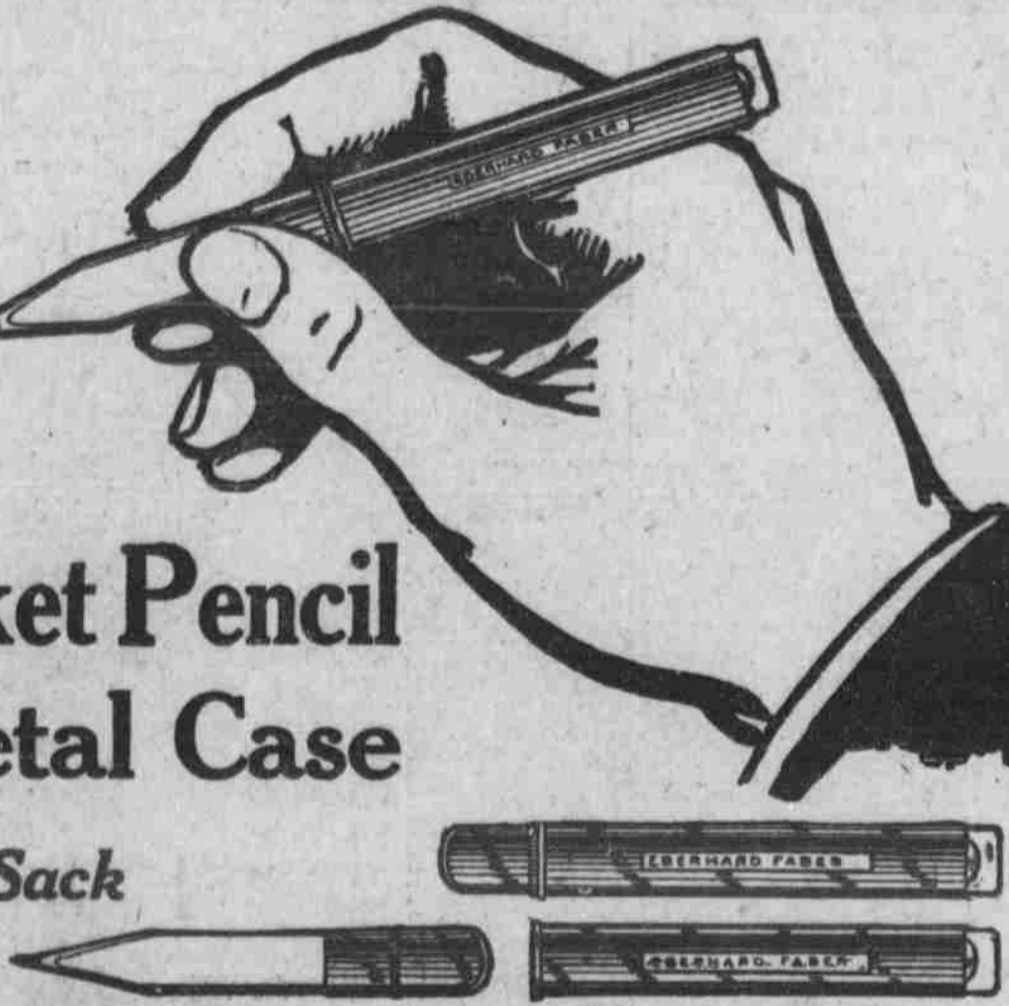
