New Books

Fiction. HOME, Anonymous. 11.5c. The Century Company.

The story concerns itself with a group of New Englanders, who live upon ancestral lands among the forest hills, with plenty of the material aids to a well-regulated life, and all the traditions and habits of families long accustomed to easy circumstances and the world's respect. Their life is ordered but human, conventional without irksomeness, set to a certain standard without being iron-bound. Various figures are sketched in, forming a not too real background. There are the judge, the captain, J. Y. and Mrs. J. Y. Nance and others. One gets little impression of these beyond idiosyncrasies of habit or speech. Then there are the actual persons of the story. The women who represent the human quality of home, among whom Clem is the best conceived and most delightful, and the men who are far wiser far from home, to long for it, to return to it, or to die away from it behind the persons are the hills and meadows and fields, the houses nestled in their trees; the white, heaven-pointed church—the home itself.

THE AFTER HOUSE, By Mary Roberts Rinehart. 25c. Pp. 112. Houghton, Mifflin Company. An absorbing tale of murder and mystery, written with all Mrs. Rinehart's charm. She has written no better story than this, and in her own language it is "a hook-peg of characters, motives, passions, all working together toward that terrible night of August 12, 1911, when hell seemed loose on a painted sea."

SUNSHINE JANE, By Anne Warner. 25c. Pp. 31. Little, Brown & Co. Sunshine Jane was a nurse and her mission was not to cure the sick bodies, but to heal sick souls. So when she came to take care of her invalid aunt, who promptly discarded her invalidism, and expounded her beliefs to friends and neighbors, the village found itself quite upset, and the various characters followed Jane's teachings as far as they were materially applicable to themselves with most astonishing results.

MRS. BRAND, By H. A. Mitchell Kennerly. 25c. Pp. 112. Small, Maynard & Co. Taking as her theme church "politics," the author depicts a problem that is alive because she shows how deeply it involves living, breathing men and women. The fascination of the pastor of the fashionable church, the faith of his elder parishioner, the strength of character of the latter's wife, the viewpoint of the altruistic young physician—all these personalities live in Mrs. Kennerly's pages as men and women whom the reader knows intimately.

THE PRECIPICE, By Ella W. Peattie. 45c. Pp. 112. Houghton, Mifflin Company. An interesting story offers an epitome of the aspirations, doubts, dreams, furtive discontent and frank hope of women. The chief character in the story is a girl who hesitates long between love and what she conceives to be the larger duty, but eventually finds a way to reconcile the two.

Mrs. Peattie formerly lived in Omaha and the book will be doubly interesting to her many friends here.

THE BEST MAN, By Grace Livingston Hill Lutz. 30c. Pp. 112. J. B. Lippincott Company. The story of what happened to a young man in the government secret service when he was sent on a delicate mission to New York to get possession of a stolen paper of immense consequence. He had to meet at dinner, under an assumed personality, the people who had stolen the paper and who had invited him in the belief that he could translate the cipher for them. He managed his escape, was chased and fell into a bridal party, where he was welcomed as the expected and delayed bridegroom. And before he knew it he was marching to the altar with a girl on his arm he had never seen before. And presently they were starting off on their wedding trip. All this takes place in the first few chapters and makes the basis for the tangles and adventures and amazing happenings of the next few days.

OLD VALENTINES, By Munson Havens. 25c. Pp. 112. Houghton, Mifflin Company. A sweet and whimsical love story concerning a pair of lovers who continue to have love adventures—with each other—after they were married. This was owing to the fact that John Landless, the hero, was a poet, and partly to the additional fact that Sir Peter Oglebay, the heroine's uncle and guardian, was frantically in love with her. Some pleasantly surprising things happen, and some unusually picturesque ones.

RUTH ANNE, By Rose Cullen Bryant. 25c. Pp. 112. J. B. Lippincott Company. A distinctly readable story depicting the heart of an emotional woman past her first youth. The tale is dominated by Ruth Anne, and her struggles to fill her life without love, and her complete surrender when that loves comes.

THE IDOL-BREAKER, By Charles Fann Kennedy. 10c. Pp. 112. Harper & Bros. The theme is freedom, and the story deals with the modern struggle towards a real democracy. Little Bowdell—a village of prejudices, traditions and economic slavery—is the scene, and the principal actors are a blacksmith and a woman whose every life is as free as the wind. Their struggles to understand and practice freedom are thwarted and misunderstood by the blacksmith's wife and three representa-

tative personages of the cramped community, a lawyer, an editor and the superintendent of the Sunday school.

THE SHEARS OF DELILAH, By Virginia Terhune Van de Water. 32c. Pp. 112. G. P. Putnam's sons. Ten stories of married life are collected under the title of the first one. In each one of these stories Mrs. Van de Water gives the picture of a failure. Husband

or wife somehow fails to make good, usually with little realization of the fault of character, the lack of understanding or the difficulty that has caused the collapse of happiness.

OUR MR. WRENN, By Sinclair Lewis. 25c. Pp. 112. Harper & Bros. This story of a clerk, whose dreams of travel were at last realized, is told with that enthusiasm which comes only

with an author's first book. His romantic gazing through England with a wonderful woman—his life with unusual people in New York—is told in chapters filled with sympathetically humorous incidents. He was a great man, and a believer in the rainbow's promise.
