

FOR A CLEANUP CAMPAIGN

Civic Bodies Are to Get Back of the Movement. COUNCIL TO TAKE A HAND Mayor Dahman Will Issue a Proclamation Setting Aside One Week in April for General Cleanup.

A plan for co-operation of city commissioners, improvement and booster clubs, other civic bodies, business men and citizens in general, in a general "clean-up" of all backyards, vacant lots, alleys and streets in Omaha, is now being worked out and will be given definite form next Tuesday, when Street Commissioner J. J. Ryder will introduce a resolution at the meeting of the city commission.

The city health department is already active in prosecuting its work of clearing away unsanitary conditions, and the street cleaning department now has the streets in an unusual state of cleanliness.

Such conditions do not fall within the jurisdiction of either the health or the street departments, so must be handled by public sentiment being directed against the owners, according to Commissioner Ryder. His proposed resolution will urge all citizens and organizations to unite in the campaign to improve the general appearance of the city.

OLD GUN HELPS IN CAPTURE

Harold Bell Holds Thieves for Police at Point of Broken Gun. WERE TAKING AWAY MUCH LOOT Men Had Gone Through the Home and Piled Up Property They Expected to Steal—Both Are Bound Over.

Armed with an empty .25-caliber target pistol, Harold Bell, aged 20 years, apprehended and held for the police two daylight prowlers whom he found ransacking his home at 260 North Eighteenth street. The two fellows, George Rigley and Vernon L. Taylor, both well known to the police, had, according to witnesses, been hanging about the neighborhood all afternoon, sitting on a bench in Kountze park, where they kept a lookout of all the houses in the block.

When Mrs. C. A. Bell and her 12-year-old daughter, Gladys, mother and sister of the boy, left the house to call on a neighbor, the men crept the street from a wagon in which they had been watching a part of the time with a third individual, and tried both the front and rear door. Next door neighbors, in whose house a number of women had gathered for the afternoon, then saw the men open a basement window and enter the house.

In the meantime young Bell had come home and, securing the evening paper, had seated himself in the sun parlor. The father arrived a few moments later and went upstairs, when Harold heard some one walking on the roof of the porch. He looked outside and saw a fellow signaling to another on the roof to jump. He was aroused immediately after this by seeing a man leap to the ground from above, to be followed shortly by a companion, and start running down the street.

Young Bell ran to the front porch, commanding the prowlers to halt; the third man having disappeared. Both did so and returned part way to the house, when they were stopped by young Bell. In the meanwhile Senior Bell had observed what had taken place and, grabbing a pistol from a bureau drawer, tossed it to the boy, who was in the yard, and hurried to his aid. At the point of the weapon the two thieves, were held by the boy until the police arrived.
