Before a score of fans the Rourke Regulars trounced the Yanigans yesterday afternoon at Rourke park...

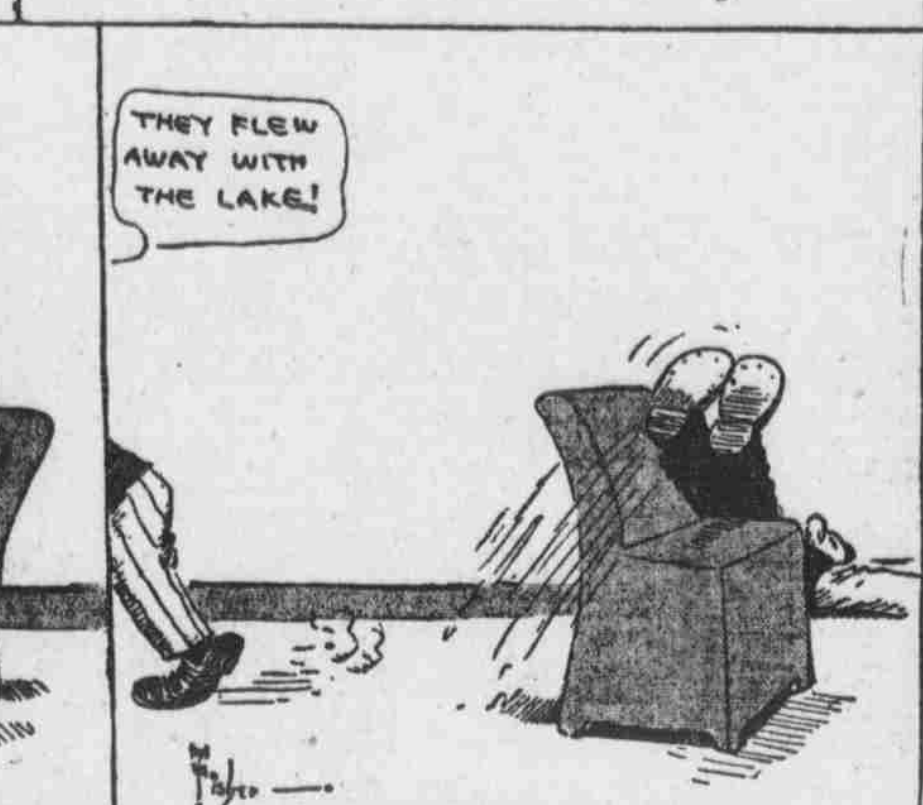
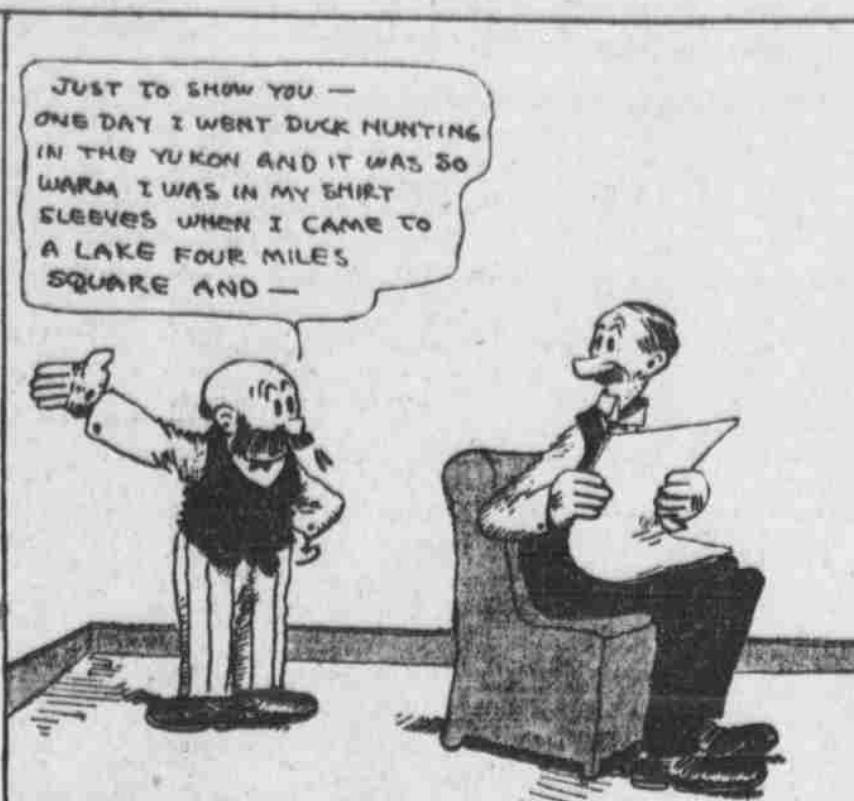
Young Alexander pitched for the Regulars for three innings and did himself proud. The Yans got but two runs and three hits, even though he was only using his slow ball.

BREAK MARKS IN ANTIPODES

Members of All-American Track Team Back from Trip.

ARRIVE AT SAN FRANCISCO

Power of Boston Athletic Association Establishes New Mark for Mile Day Before Sailing.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 1.—With four Australian and seventeen state records to their credit, the four athletes com-

prising the all-American track team arrived here today on the steamer Wilhelmina, in perfect condition and ready to compete again in ten days. The men participated in twenty-one field days during a thirteen weeks' tour of the antipodes, and did their own training and conditioning. Among the records brought home was one in the mile run made by James A. Power of the Boston Athletic association the day before the team left for America. Running on a grass track, with an extra yard lacked on to each lap, Power covered the distance in four minutes, eighteen and two-fifths seconds, breaking Alfred Shrubbs' mark of nine years standing. This is said to be the best time for the distance ever made by an American athlete on foreign soil, and is significant because of Power's difficulty in getting into form earlier in the tour. Aside from the individual performances the Americans won the team championships of Australasia and New South Wales. In the latter meet they won seven of the twelve events in which they started, and placed in all the rest of the events.
