NEW YORK. April 1.—There was indi-cations of strength in the stock market for a time today. A moderate volume of buying was sufficient to lift prices gen-erally after a brief period of hesitation in the early dealings. Trading became more active on the advance, during which a few representative charcs were bid up as much as a point, with larger gains among the specialities. Before moon a reaction set in, which ultimately levelled down the list and net changes in most cases were insignificant. The decision of the courts that holders
