





DUN'S REPORT OF BANK EXCHANGES FOR MARCH

Bank exchanges for March, according to the statement compiled by Dur's Rayraw, which includes returns from 128 leading centers in the United amounted to \$14,186,611,687, a gain of 1.0 per cent, as compared with the same mouth last year, but a decrease of 1.5 per cent from the corresponding month in 1912. Conditions appear most favorable in the Southern, Central and Western States, more or less gain being shown by those sections. New York reports lesses of 0.5 and 0.7 per cent., respectively, and the outside cities gains of 2.6 and 0.9 per cent. as contrasted with the two preceding years. Boston, Philadelphia, Pittaburgh, Baltimore and San Francisco report some falling off from last year's figures, but this is fully offset by improvement at St. Louis, New Orleans, Chicago, Cincianatt, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukes, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Kansas City. NEW YORK STOCK MARKET Gradual Slowing Down of Business is Carried Further.

PRICE MOVEMENTS ARE NARROW

Almost Only Evidence of Public Interest Lies in Sustained Inquiry for High-Grade Bonds.

NEW YORK. April 6.—The gradual slowing down of business on the Stock exchange was carried further today, and much of thetime the market was at a standstill. Price movements were narrow and in only a few cases did they vary a point from Saturday's closs.

In spite of the small amount of buying there was still apparent the scarcity of stocks which has been a noticeable feature for some time. To satisfy the scattering buying orders it was necessary to raise quotations slightly in nearly every case. Toward the close the list eased off slightly. Total transactions were not far above the 100,000 mark.

Almost the only evidence of public interest lay in the sustained inquiry for high grade bonds. Accumulation of kile money here, which is largely the outgrowth of sluggish business conditions, has progressed to a point where a large volume of funds is seeking employment. The unexpected loss in cash shown in Saturday's bank statement checked the downward course of money rates, but it is not expected that there will be any any permanent departure from current easy conditions.

A large number of railroads, operating in various sections, made their February returns today, and in almost every case averse shrinkage in earnings were shown. Canadian Pacific showed some heaviness, probably on account of a slump in the London market. London was occupied with the settlement and did virtually nothing here.

Prices of some bonds yielded, but in general the bond market was firm. Total sales, E. 200,000. United States 2s, registered, declined 4 on call.
