### Pitcher Hamilton Returns to Browns

ST. LOUIS, April 16-President Hedges of the St. Louis Americans and Earl Hamilton, pitcher, who disregarded his contract with the St. Louis Americans to sign with the Kansas City Federals, and yesterday decided to return to St. Louis, arrived here today from Columbus, Kan.

On his arrival Hamilton gave out the following signed statement: "I want to make a public statement to

the St. Louis fans and to my teammates I was under written contract to play with the Browns in 1914 and 1915. It was a big mistake for me to go to Kansas I did not realize how big a mistake it was until I got to thinking it over and had a talk with my father. "Mr. Hedges has always treated me right and when I got to thinking about him and Mr. Rickey and my contract I

decided to de right." President Hedges said he did not give Hamilton an increase in salary. The pitcher, he said, returned solely as the result of moral sussion.
