

MUST LEVY FOR WATER FUND

Judge Baker Says City Must Provide Not to Exceed 3 Mills.

STILL ROWING OVER CLAIMS

City Wants Water Board to Pay Taxes Alleged to Be Due and Board Wants Back the Money Loaned.

City Corporation Counsel Ben S. Baker will hold an opinion to the city commission that the city must levy not to exceed 3 mills for the water board.

Mayor James C. Dahlman, who said he would fight the levy, which will raise \$107,000, unless the court or the city legal department ruled that the fight would be useless, will abide by Judge Baker's decision.

Judge Baker will formally request the water board to pay the city \$20,000 taxes due from the water company when the water board assumed control July 1, 1912, after the company had been assessed April 1 for \$50,000 taxes.

General Manager R. B. Howell of the water district says the city could not logically pay itself the \$27,000, but Judge Baker is of the opinion that the payment could be legally made.

The water board loaned the city council \$12,000 to pay for damages to property incident to the opening of a street, and if the \$27,000 is paid this money will be paid back. Otherwise it will be retained.

Mayor Dahlman, in agreeing with Judge Baker, said there was still in his mind a doubt as to the propriety of the methods pursued by the water board. He objected to the setting aside of \$10,000 a year for a depreciation fund, believing it is too large a sum.
