HANS WAGNER APPOINTED FISH COMMISSIONER

Postmasters Not Responsible for Money Stolen

SIOUN FALLS, S. D., April 23.-(Special.)-Judge Elliot, of the United States court, has rendered a decision holding that the United States government cannot recover from P. J. Rodge, postmaster of Sioux Falls, the value of a \$10,000 package of money which was consigned to a Sioux Falis bank and which mysteriously disappeared from the local postoffice about two years ago. Judge Elliot held in substance that there was no liability on the part of the postmaster unless negligence was shown. and that nothing of the kind had been shown in this case.

The cause was instituted as a test and in the hope that if postmasters could Time: 1:45 be held liable in such cases, the insur-O'Loughlin. ance companies which insure money transmitted through the mails which is stolen can recover from the postmaster from whose office the money disappeared. This is the first case of the kind ever instituted in the United States, and the decision of Judge Elliof will not be pleasing to the insurance companies which make a business of insuring money sent by mail, but will . e welcome to all postmasters throughout the union who may at any time have valuable money packages disappear from their postoffices.


