
French Cabinet Asks Funds to Entertain Two Sovereigns

PARIS, April 28.-The cabinet has asked Parliament to vote the equivalent f \$81,000 to entertain the kings of England and Denmark when they visit Paris for a cocuple of days this month. Three quarters of this sum is to be snent by the Mrs. M. J. Williams, a prominent club foreign office in decorations, illuminations, presents to the soveregns, receptions, official dinners and special trains.
