Nebraska Charities Will Hold Three Days' Meeting in Omaha-

TALK OVER SITUATION

Methods of Handling Crime and Poverty in Cities Will Be Brought Up for Analysis and Remedies Suggested.

It will be nothing less than a high class school of sociology conducted for three days in Omaha beginning Sunday and lasting until Tuesday evening when the Nebraska Conference of Charities and Correction is held here. Thirty-six numbers are on the program. This means that, by discounting a few of the numbers which are invocations and addresses of welcome there are to be about thirty high class papers and discussions by experts on the subjects that properly come before such a body of delegates from all parts of the state.




