Exposition Notes.

Visitors to the Panama-Pacific International exposition in San Francisco will be given the opportunity of seeing off the shelves of Mother Hubbard's cupboard. In Frederic Thompson's "Toyland Grown Up" concession, the famed cupboard, no longer bare, and grown to a height of eighty feet, will house a five-story restaurant—one story to each shelf. Mother Hubbard, seventy feet high, and her dog, thirty feet high, will stand in front of the cupboard, which will be entered by passing in through the lower panels of the enormous door to the bottom "shelf." Stairways will lead to the higher "shelves." Limited to the height of each "shelf" will be giant plates, twenty feet in diameter. On one shelf visitors may dance over a huge table, ten feet in diameter. Tables will surround this dance floor and will fill the space of other "shelves," and refreshments and meals will be served.

NEW YORKER SHOCKED AT OMAHA'S POLICE STATION

Katherine R. Davis, commissioner of corrections of New York City, visited the city jail accompanied by a delegation from the Woman's club. After being shown through the structure she remarked, "It couldn't be worse."

"No matter how low a man or woman has fallen, Omaha has no right to submit prisoners to the torture of staying in such a place. To keep a human being in such an ill ventilated hole is a crime within itself."

Mrs. Davis highly commended the manner in which Matron Gibbons conducts and keeps her department, stating that with the surroundings it was a veritable miracle.

JOHN H. HULBERT SUFFERS SERIOUS ACCIDENT TO FOOT

John H. Hulbert, 75 years old, who, on his last birthday gave notice to all it might concern that he did not believe this use of tobacco ever prevented any man from living to a ripe old age, suffered a serious accident Saturday when his foot was crushed by an elevator at the Millard hotel. He is at the Presbyterian hospital.

Mr. Hulbert has used tobacco for more than fifty-five years. He is bailiff in District Judge Estelle's court and is known as "the grand old man of the court house."

NEW YORKER APPLIES FOR JOB AS CITY PLANNER

John F. Hammond, an engineer of New York, has applied for the position of landscape architect under the city planning ordinance before the council, and the commission, which is now considering the proposition of hiring a city planner. The application will be read at the meeting of the city council Tuesday. The ordinance, creating the city planning commission has been postponed.

SIX INDICTED BY FEDERAL GRAND JURY GIVE BONDS

Six of the men indicted by the recent federal grand jury in connection with the alleged wild horse frauds, have appeared before the clerk of the United States district court and filed bonds for their appearance for trial.

Those whose bonds have been filed and approved are: John Boley, \$7,000; Ashbury O. Perry and A. D. Houghton, \$5,000 each; Charles W. West, R. F. Burwinkle and Ben Fiddler, \$3,000 each.

DADS RECOMMEND MEAT INSPECTION ORDINANCE

An ordinance regulating the work of the city meat inspectors, introduced by Police Commissioner A. C. Kugel, has been recommended for passage in committee of the whole. The ordinance simply embodies the rules under which the inspectors have worked, without authority under any ordinance.

GARBAGE COLLECTION IS RESUMED BY DEPARTMENT

The city garbage collection department has resumed the work of collecting garbage twice a week, after a period of several weeks, during which citizens had to pay for removal of garbage, because of shortage of funds in the department.

CONTROL STATIONS IN FLIGHT AROUND WORLD

Arnold Kruckman, chief of the bureau of aeronautics of the Panama-Pacific International exposition, is now making a tour of the United States in an endeavor to definitely decide upon control stations for the great exposition circumnavigation race around the globe for prizes now guaranteed of \$300,000 and which may aggregate more than \$100,000. It is the intention of Mr. Kruckman to carefully inspect the entire course as laid out and it is probable that with this in view he will sail for Europe in May.

British Artist is Planning to Attend

The British committee formed in connection with the Panama-Pacific International exposition announces that Sir Edward Poynter, president of the Royal Academy, supported by a committee of well known artists, has applied for official recognition from the government for a British fine art section at San Francisco in 1915. This request, formally transmitted to Mr. Buxton, president of the Board of Trade, is signed by Sir Edward Poynter and Sir Ernest Waterlow, late president of the Royal Water-Color society; Sir James D. Linton, president of the Royal Institute of Water-Colors; Mr. Walter W. Ulesse, Mr. Frank Dicksee and Mr. Hamo Thornycroft. They have informed the government that in their view the high position which the British school holds, and which has been fully recognized at recent international exhibitions, should be maintained and made known in the United States independently of any possible commercial advantages which might ensue.

FLYING AROUND "GEE WHIZ" CANDLE WILL BE NOVELTY

Seated within the bodies of huge moths, flies and other insects, visitors to the Panama-Pacific International exposition may enjoy the novel sensation of flying about a gigantic candle 110 feet in height.

This is to be one of the features of "Toyland Grown-Up," the concession upon the exposition grounds at San Francisco, in which Frederic Thompson expects to spend \$1,000,000. It will be known as the "Gee Whiz Candle," consisting of a huge candlestick holding a burning candle of enormous size.

Mechanically propelled aeroplanes will fly about the flame of the candle, each car resembling an insect.
