Predictions of clearing weather instead of the rains that have been delaying the planters brought about increased rural offerings of corn and acted as an offset to bullish advices from Argentine. Cash demand was only fair. In oats, the cutting down of stocks here rendered the May option firm. Auspicious crop conditions eased off the deferred futures.
