

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Too Many Longs in Wheat Pit Bring Down the Prices. SPECULATION IS AT LOW TIDE Commission Concerns and Scalpers Are Complaining of Lack of Business and Few Are Allowed Profits to Escape.

There were too many longs in the wheat market at Chicago who attempted to secure profits yesterday, and the result was a price loss of as much as 1/8c for the deferred futures, while the May showed a gain of 1/4c. Reports received from many sections of Missouri were of the same kind, and those spread out during the latter part of last week. If there was any change in the matter of crop losses.
