Sellers were asking steady prices, and while all indications pointed to a decline of some sort, the break proposed was, to their way of thinking, entirely too large, and as buyers refused to better their bids, nothing moved until well along in the forenoon. In the end, however, values strengthened up somewhat, the improvement, in most cases, amounting to about 25c and while sellers refused at first to accept these figures, that supply finally started to move slowly at prices that were generally 5610c lower than Monday's general market.
