THINK MOREHEAD WILL RUN

Those on Inside Declare He Will Make Race for Governor.

PRESSURE EXERTED IS GREAT

Visitors Galore Call Upon Him and Telegrams and Letters Pour In Urging Him to Break His One-Term Pledge.

LINCOLN, May 22—(Special.)—It seems to be the prevailing opinion around the state house today that Governor Morehead has come to the conclusion that the demand for him to accept a second nomination for governor at the hands of the democratic party is so great that he cannot do otherwise as a loyal democrat but accept the filing and risk defeat at the hands of the republicans this fall.

Those within the inner circle, who have been engineering the campaign to have

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the governor file, are going around with wise books, saying that everything is all right.

Every possible pressure has been brought upon the executive to change his mind and switch to the gubernatorial track. Appointees without number and interested politicians by the score have interviewed and on bended knees pleaded with the executive to save the jobs, and the pressure has been too great for him to withstand.

Appointees Into the Fray.

One appointee found it convenient to make a trip to Valentine on state business and within twenty-four hours after his arrival there numerous telegrams and letters were being received at the executive's office emphasizing the "demand."

Today George Rogers and Harley G. Moorhead, the former on the governor's staff and the latter his appointee as election commissioner of Douglas county, were conferring with the governor. Other Omaha democrats have from time to time been in conference with the executive and it is believed it has had the effect of

doing a great deal toward convincing the governor that a sacrifice is needed.

Just when the governor will make the announcement that he will accept the filing, if he does accept, is hard to tell. The law gives him five days in which to accept. A receipt for the filing fee was received by the secretary of state yesterday, which, with the five-day limit, will make the last day the governor can act as next Wednesday, according to the secretary of state, who does not count Sunday.

In the meantime George W. Borge is getting ready to land on Governor Morehead's administration and every other administration which has ever held forth in Nebraska. It is understood that Borge will base his right to the nomination on the fact that he has always been a loyal democrat. It has made no difference whether the candidate for governor was as dry as the desert of Sahara or as wet as the Gulf of Mexico. George W. Borge surely, upon such a record of loyalty to party candidates, is entitled to something if it is nothing more than second place when the votes are counted.
