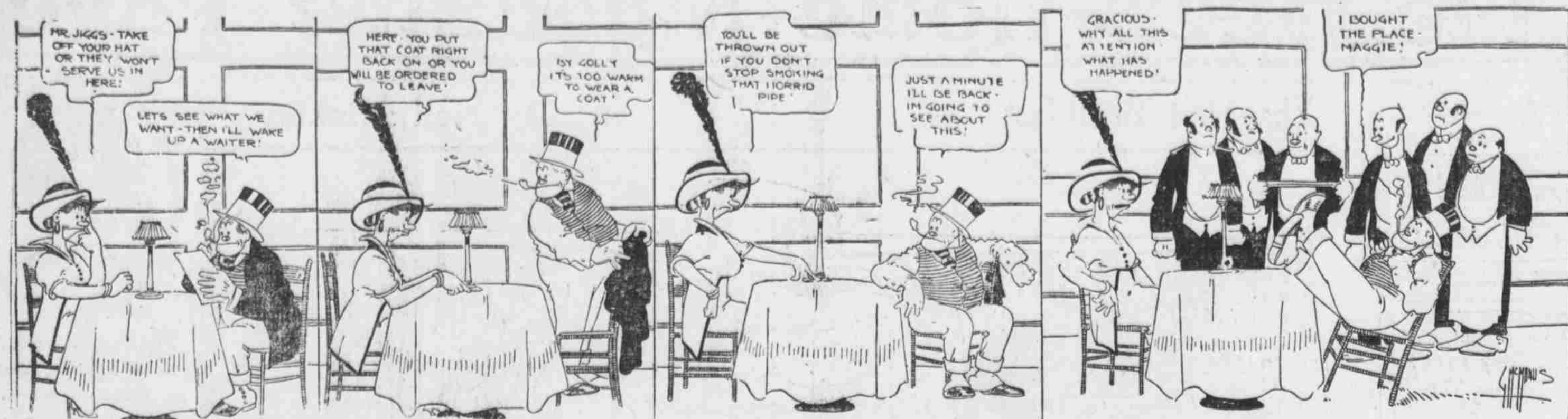

TIPPLE WINS HIS OWN GAME

Twirler Knocks in Winning Run in Tenth with Single.

CONGALTON CLOUTS HOMER

Bunk Makes First Circuit Bust by Rourke Athlete. This Season, but Tipple's Timely Hit Puts the Outfielder in Shade.

It was for a while the general belief of the gathering of fans at Bourke park yesterday afternoon that Bunk Congalton was holding some kind of a special day in his honor, for Bunk knocked a home run over the right field fence in the first inning, the first action of its kind regulated by a Rourke athlete this season, but Dan Tipple, the public relations athlete, sneaked in and grabbed the bats. With the score a tie, 7 to 7, in the last of the tenth, two men out and Joe Ward on third base, Daniel snote one perfectly good single to left, winning his own battle, 8 to 7.

Maddox had two strikes on the handsome twirler and the bugs resigned themselves to the best, as Willie Lee Crosby under the same conditions had whiffed on Nick Maddox's curves. On the subsequent pitch Joe Ward started for the plate. This put it up to Maddox to put it over the middle. The ball went according to directions and sailed on a line for the plate. If Tipple had let it go Ump Jack Haskell would have been compelled to call it a strike and Tipple would have been out and Ward's dash would have been in vain. This put it up to Tipple to deliver. And Tipple delivered. He swung his heavy green bat, the bat met the ball on the nose and the game was over.

Until that whirlwind finish the combat was exceedingly busy. Vaughn started for the Weches and blew sky high. Congalton started for Omaha and he finally went up. Maddox relieved Vaughn and Tipple relieved Congalton and both pitched right-glide ball.

Wichita Score in First. Wichita made three in the opener. Nicholson's single, steal of second and O'Rourke's double made one. Henry was then hit by a pitched ball and Graham's single scored O'Rourke. Bills' single scored Henry.

Wichita made no more until the sixth when Congalton ascended. Bills and Boswell started and Fitzsimmons' double scored Bills. Schipke's error led the double and Fitzsimmons score. Congalton captured the two remaining out, although he juggled O'Rourke's high fly for a minute, thus making the bugs stand on end for that length of time. Congalton opened the seventh by hitting Henry for the second time. He then walked Graham and Tipple. Tipple walked Graham and Tipple before he was warmed up, and then Boswell got a lucky single to left. With three men on bases still, Tipple buckled down to work and no more scores were made.

Rourke's Get Early Lead. The Rourke got a good lead in the first with five scores. Clancy singled and Krug was walked. Thomson rolled one to Vaughn, who attempted to get Clancy at third. He threw the ball into the grandstand and Clancy and Krug hiked home over the fence, scoring Thomson before him. Ward singled to center and Chase drove one through Henry which scored Ward.

Two more were annexed in the second. Skipper Bill Schipke, the famous aquatic athlete, walked and went to second on a batted ball. Clancy attempted to sacrifice, but Maddox tried to catch Skip at third. A useless attempt, as Skip beat the throw, which was bad anyway. Krug forced Clancy at second, but Thomson walked, and Ward hit the punch after Congalton died. Both Schipke and Krug came home on the hit.

From then on all was off with Nick Maddox's pitching until the fatal tenth. Congalton flew out in that inning, but Ward connected safely for the third time. Chase was safe on O'Rourke's error, but Crosby struck out. Here Dan Tipple appeared on the scene of action and now Dan is a hero in Omaha.
