Educators to Meet at San Francisco

One of the most important of the conventions at San Francisco is the National Education association, with a delegate strength of upward of 400. With this great body of education will be linked the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations, together with an International Congress of Education. Of peculiar interest to these delegates will be the unique and practical exhibits in the great five-acre Palace of Education and Social Economy, embodying features for which the schools of each city are especially noted, with model classes of pupils, vocational training exhibits and displays showing what boys and girls have achieved in agriculture and horticulture.

Council of Nurses Has Many Delegates

The International Council of Nurses will send fully 6,000 delegates to San Francisco. With them will meet the organizations representing the instructors in nurses' schools, and the National Organization of Public Health Nurses, dealing with tuberculosis, settlement work and social centers. The National Red Cross, the American Academy of Medicine, the Panama-Pacific Dental congress, the National Commission on Mental Hygiene and many related bodies will meet during the summer at the exposition.

MILITARY TOURNAMENT AT 'FRISCO TO BE HUGE EVENT

There will also be an international military tournament at the Panama-Pacific fair with troops from at least sixteen countries; a great world's naval pageant, with 200 war vessels in line, later to be anchored under the walls of the exposition palaces; and finally, the first great international aviation tournament, with airships and dirigibles from all the great powers. And from the aviation field in May the birdmen will start on the \$200,000 prize globe-girding race, the most spectacular and daring breaking enterprise ever attempted by a world's exposition.

INSURANCE MEN FROM OVER WORLD TO FRATERNIZE

Accident prevention, fire prevention and health conservation will be some of the main topics discussed at the first World's Insurance congress ever held, at the exposition in 1915. For the first time in history delegates representing accident, fire, marine, employers' liability, industrial surety, health and other lines of insurance from the whole world will fraternize, over 300 insurance organizations being represented.

PROTEST NEW BUILDING CODE, Siren Whistle Will Tell of the Start of Ak-Sar-Ben Season

Contractors Say the Requirements Are Too Stringent.
NO CHANCE TO MAKE A PROFIT
No More Cheap Structures for Quick Sale—Some Now Being Built May Be Ordered Torn Down.

Contractors who have been speculating in houses are storming the office of the city building inspector to protest against the new building code, which, they say, is so stringent that this year's houses cannot be built to compete with buyers with last year's houses.

Also, there is a loud wail from the builders of thin-walled houses, who have been putting up cheap structures quickly for sale. Some of these houses are now in course of construction and the building department will order them torn down and built under the ordinance where the work has not progressed too far.

"To build under this new code it will be necessary to spend from \$20 to \$50 more on the foundation of each house," said a contractor in the building inspection office. "That will take away the profit. I've a notion to quit building houses for sale."

PETITION FOR TRACKAGE ON STREET IS REJECTED

Two hundred residents of the city in the vicinity of Twentieth and Pierce streets appeared before the city commission to protest against granting the Chicago & Northwestern and the Mason City & Fort Dodge railroads permission to lay tracks on or across Twentieth street.

The protesters said it would be a nuisance, would damage their property and disturb their repose if this trackage were laid on Twentieth street. The council, after hearing the protesters, accepted their petition and turned down the application.

500 Block Ginger Club to Register at Devil's Hotel

Seventeen members of the 500 Block Ginger club will register at the Devil's hotel at the Ak-Sar-Ben den this evening and will be initiated into the order in a body. They will be one of the first booster organizations to join the realm of the king, and so have been accorded first-night privileges at his majesty's satanic hostelry.

MRS. FREDERICK TEST IS BURIED AT FOREST LAWN

The funeral of Mrs. Frederick Test, wife of Lieutenant Test, U. S. A., was held at the home of F. A. Bieby, 1822 Emmet street, at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. Rev. T. J. Mackay of All Saints Episcopal church officiated. Interment was at Forest Lawn cemetery. The body arrived from Santa Fe, N. M., Sunday evening.

SPARKS FALLING INTO NEST THREATENS A COSTLY FIRE

An otherwise harmless spark from a switch engine falling into a sparrow's nest in the eaves of a cattle chute between the sheds of the Union Stock Yards Company and Armour & Co.'s plant at South Omaha threatened for a little while to develop into high priced blaze. 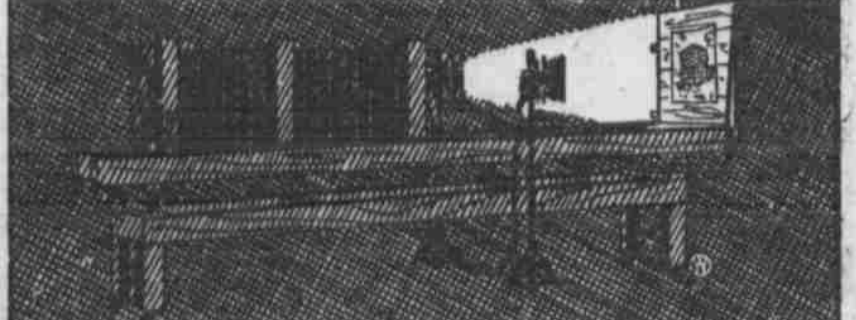
