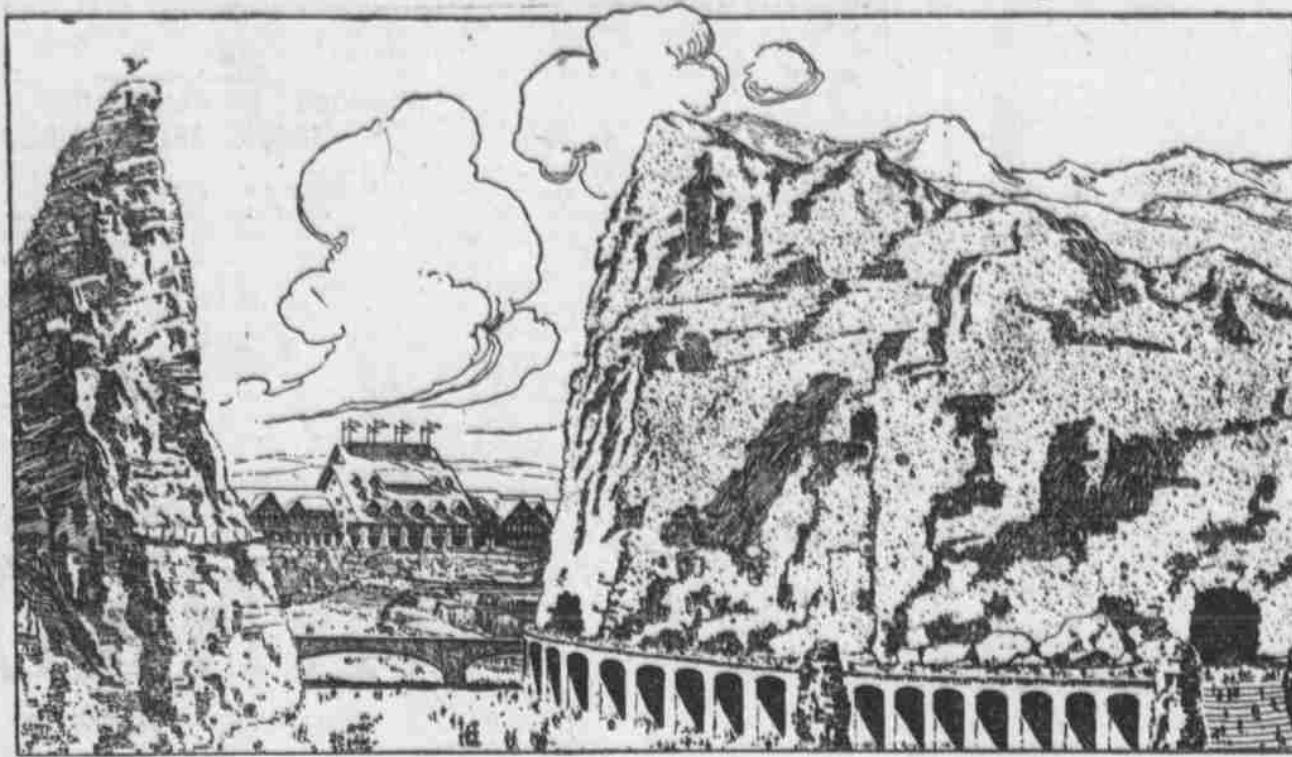

Yellowstone Park in Miniature at Panama Exposition



The above is a drawing of the Union Pacific system's Yellowstone park exhibit at the Panama-Pacific International exposition to be held in San Francisco next year. The exhibit will occupy four acres of space, will cost a quarter of a million dollars and will convey to the visitor a vivid idea of what the park itself com-

prises. To the extreme left is shown Eagle Seat Rock; to the right the Golden Gate Viaduct; in the central background Old Faithful Inn. The inn will be an exact reproduction of the original, being constructed entirely of rustic timber, and will have one of the most attractive dining rooms on the exposition grounds with

a seating capacity of 2,500 people. The Union Pacific system selected Yellowstone National park for reproduction for the reason that it is interested in bringing to the people, who have not as yet been fortunate enough to visit the park, a comprehensive idea of the wonders to be seen in this greatest of natural wonderlands.

URGES CONTRIBUTIONS TO EXPOSITION BUILDING FUND

Governor Morehead's proclamation fixing June 17 as "Nebraska Panama Pacific day," declares that on that day Nebraskans who feel the patriotic impulses associated with the exposition movement should send dollars to Lieutenant Governor S. R. McKelvie, Lincoln. "Dollar day" was the method selected by the temporary commission named by the governor to decide on a way to raise the money for Nebraska building at the San Francisco exposition. Each donor will receive a bronze medalion bearing the seal of the state.

CHINESE COMMISSIONERS TO EXPOSITION ARRIVE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—Three commissioners from China to the Panama-Pacific International exposition and fifty Chinese artisans arrived here today by the liner "Chiao Yang." They were met at the pier by the Chinese consular general and a reception party from the exposition. The artisans were permitted to enter this country by a special act of congress.
