OMAHA. Neb., June 17.

There is little in the conditions surrounding the wheat market on which to make purchases. The crop is moving in increased quantities and prices are likely to sell to a lower level. Good weather is needed to permit of harvesting and threshing new wheat, as well as moving it to the railroad stations.

It seemed at one time yesterday as if the heavy and general rains in the southwest and south would check the downward trend of values for the time being, but the increased selling by some of the larger commission houses against the actual wheat to come forward drove many of the early buyers out of their position and caused net losses for the day of 165%.

While St. Louis reported that the larger cash houses were not receiving favorable responses to bids sent out Tuesday night, there was a different story from cash handlers.

Chicago, as well as Kabsas City, reported heavy purchases of the new crop over night. The states selling new wheat were lowa, Nebraska, Illinois, Indiana. Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. Some of these states were pressing their grain for sale, which caused the cash handlers in Chicago to back away.

The first car of new wheat from the southwest was received at Chicago yesterday by the J. Rosenbaum Grain company from Oklahoma. According to Frank Rice, secretary of the Star and Crescent Milling company, this grain was in milling condition. The first car of the new crop received in Chicago iast year was on June 30.
