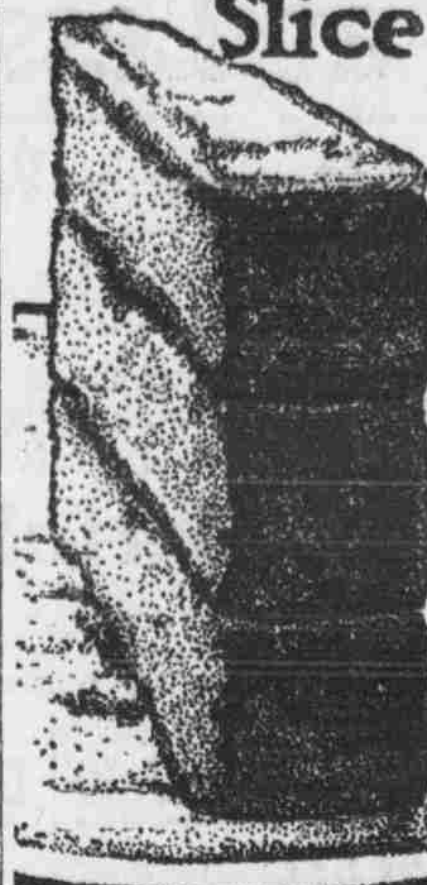
**MATRON GIBBONS TAKING CARE OF STREATOR GIRL**
