I. W. W. Officer Expounds Its Creed

NEW YORK, June 18.—Edward Zuercher, secretary and treasurer of the Industrial Workers of the World, expounded the beliefs of that organization before the federal industrial commission which today held its last meeting in this city. He said that the leaders of the \$15 strike among the Paterson silk workers had never counseled violence nor approved it. Most of the bombs set off during the disorders, he contended, had been planted by detectives employed by mill owners.

Zuercher admitted under questioning that sabotage was common in all industries. "When a hand wants a day off and can't get it, he drops a screw driver into the machinery," said the witness. "The Industrial Worker," he contended, "does not advocate arbitration, mediation and conciliation. These methods have been rejected by the workers and have never proved to be a success."
