Three Men at Morris & Co. Seriously Injured When Air Compressor Blows Up—Foreman Corri-gan Loses Fingers.

What promises to be a sensational case began yesterday when Emmett Rick Lindsey, a South Omaha fireman, was arrested for alleged attempt to assault the 19-year-old daughter of Ed Hoover, a Sarpy county farmer. Lindsey was arrested by Chief of Detectives James Sheahan and Sheriff Grant Chase of Sarpy. He was lodged in the South Omaha Jail.

The case grew out of a happening at a barn dance held two weeks ago in the town of Ed Hoover in Sarpy county, which Lindsey attended. Since the occurrence Ed Hoover, father of the girl, has spent some time looking for Lindsey, it is said. He went to Mayor Hector's house the morning after the happening and threatened to kill Lindsey, it is said. Lindsey is said to have remained in hiding for some days. Lindsey says there is nothing to the charge. He claims that the girl became offended at something said to her by him and that her complaints followed.
