ROURKES DIVIDE DOUBLE-HEADER

Omaha Wins First Game from Boosters, 11 to 3, but Drops Second One, 2 to 1.

STYLES AND GROVER HURL

Former Is Successful, but Partners in Trouble Lose for the Latter.

OPENER MARKED BY HITTING

Rourke's Slaughter Des Moines Heavens with Fifteen Hits.

ERRORS LOSE SECOND BATTLE

Three Errors Assist in Run-Getting in Second Fray, Which is Called in Order to Catch Train for Des Moines.

Pa Rourke's demon athletes had to be content with an even break on a double bill Saturday afternoon with Frank Isbell's antiquated Boosters from Des Moines. The Rourkes battered home the first game, 11 to 3, but lost the second battle, 2 to 1.

Red Styles, recent acquisition, was a large and prominent hero in the opening combat, but a big bunch of the credit is also due the Rourke hitters, who piled up fifteen regular swats during the course of the afternoon. Bert Grover, the well known invalid, despite suffering from a meanly disposed ball on his handsome countenance, headed the second fray, and did very well except that he lost the game. It was really no fault of Grover's that he didn't cop. The athletes telling in his support were a little short on support and three errors enabled the antiquate to win.

The Rourkes were exceedingly loud and noisy in their batting in the first contest, but in the second the visiting infielders were altogether too careless in projecting themselves in the path of the hurling sphere as it left some Omaha bats. Due to this uncalculated activity some seven or eight predestined safe knocks failed to finish as they should. Hunter, Ewald, Jones, Reilly and Breen scrambled all over the pasture after the pill at just the times they had no business to do so. Thus it was that Nick Lakoff, the most procrastinating pitcher in captivity and the only living exponent of knee ball, was able to come out with his spine straight.

Thomas Gets Homer. Among other features of the initial battle was one home run clout by Fred Thomas. For some weeks Fred has been peevish because he hadn't as yet made a home run. As Fred clouted about twenty in the W. I. circuit last year, where the fences are made to keep kids out and not to rob athletes of home runs, he couldn't figure out why some of his blows should not sail over the Western league fences. Yesterday he put a little extra pressure behind one swing and the pill fluttered gently over the right wall, while Mr. Hahn gazed upward with intense scorn written all over his map.

One-side opened noisily against Sam Lafferty in the second inning of the first combat, much to the disgust of that gentleman. Two runs were made in that stanza on three hits. In the sixth and the ninth the Boosters were allowed to make runs. Three hits brought two in the sixth and an error and a hit in the ninth. Inconsequential, all of them, as they were insufficient to cause alarm.

A Run Without a Hit.

The Boosters opened the second contest with a run. Hahn whiffed, but Hunter was walked. He promptly swiped second and went to third when Ward erred in favor of Breen. Breen and Hunter started a double steal. Breen was not only safe, but Shestak hurred the pill wild and Hunter scored. Nary a hit.

ALICE PRENDERGAST AND MARY VOORHEES WIN TITLE

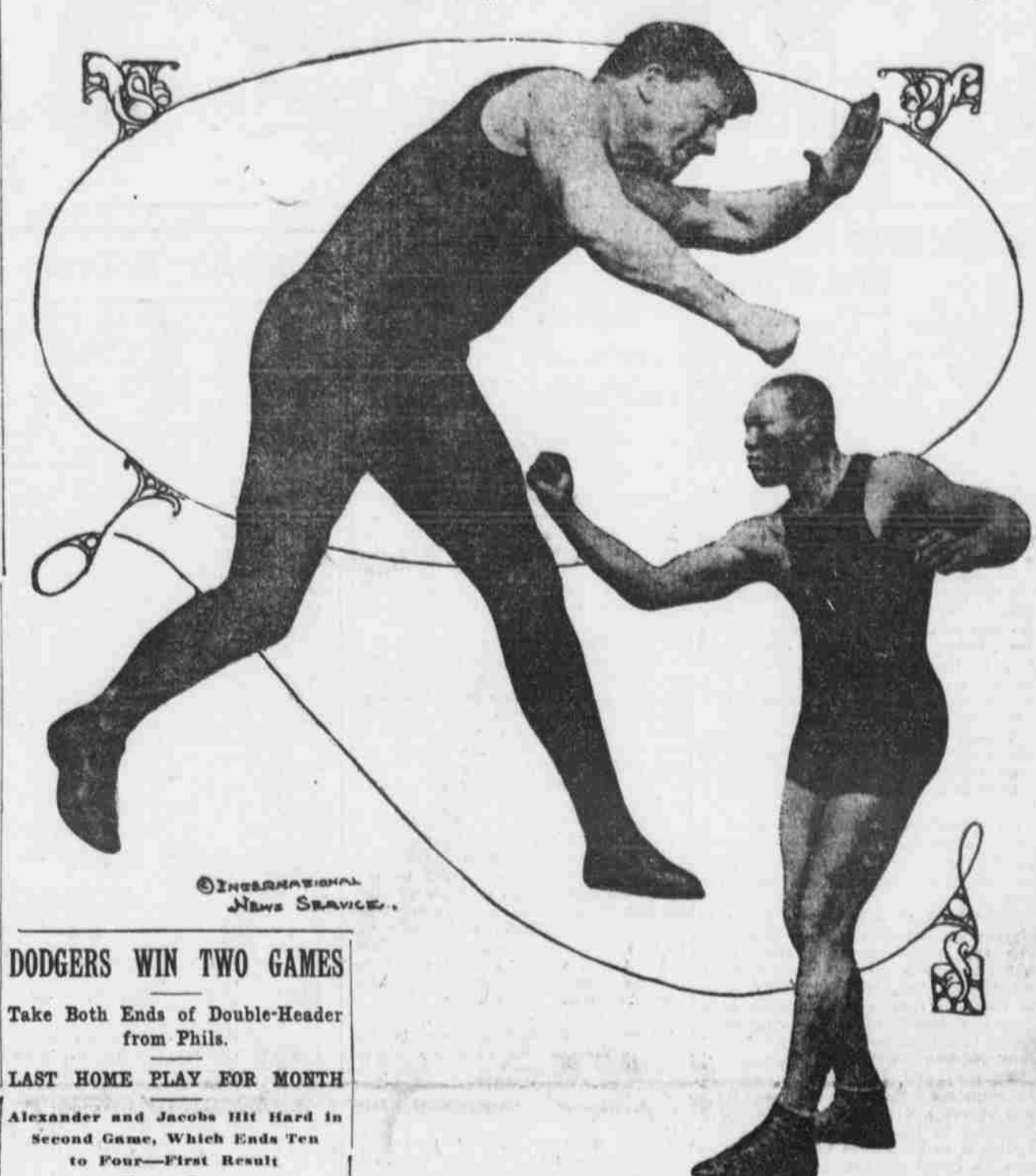

Negro Heavyweight Champion Defeats Frank Moran of Pittsburgh in Twenty Rounds.

HARD SMASHES BY THE BLACK

Smoke Fails to Deliver Single Knockdown or Anything Looking Like Finishing Blow.

NO MARKS OF FRAY UPON HIM

Opponent's Face Bleeding from Cuts on Nose and Under Eye.

MUCH JEERING FOR WHITE MAN

His Tactics in Hanging Frequently on Giant Displeased Save Himself Displeased Crowd Toward Last.

VELODROME D'HYVER, June 25.—Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion fighter, tonight retained the title by defeating Frank Moran of Pittsburgh in a twenty-round contest on points. There was plenty of hard hitting on the part of Johnson, but not a single knockdown or anything that looked like a finishing blow.

Moran's face was bleeding from cuts on the nose and under the left eye. Johnson showed no marks.

Towards the end of the fighting the crowd jeered a good deal at some of the tactics of Moran, who hung frequently on Johnson to save himself. When the gong rang, Referee Carpenter immediately announced Johnson as the winner. Johnson entered the ring at 10:30 amid cheering. A great shout went up as Moran followed. The crowd gave Moran a better hand than Johnson. George Carpenter, the French champion, referee, was given an ovation.

Fight by Rounds.
