ROURKES LOSE THEM BOTH

Boosters Take First Game by Whirlwind Finish, Two to One.

ALMOST IN OMAHA'S HANDS

Second Contest More in Nature of Walkaway and is Gathered in by Score of Eight to Two.

DES MOINES, June 28.—(Special Telegram.)—In one of the most thrilling finishes seen on the local diamond this season Des Moines grabbed the first game out of the fire in the last half of the ninth by the score of 2 to 1. The first thrill was furnished by Omaha in its half of the final round. With one down and the same apparently left, J. E. Crosby whaled a home run over the left field fence.

It looked like an extra inning fray with the tall end of the Boosters' batting order up. Ewaldt, however, landed a Texas leaguer and Morgridge sacrificed him to second. Eddie Hahn delivered in the pinch and a hot line just inside first base scored Ewaldt with the deciding run. Des Moines' first run was made on Jones' single, a walk to Hales, an out and Ewaldt's hit in the second stanza.

It was a pitchers' battle, with Morgridge having a shade the better of the argument. Willis distinguished himself by his work in the pinches. In the third round, with men on second and third, he struck out Brown. He filled the bases right away again by walking Jones, but Hales went out on three strikes and the round was safe. In the sixth and again in the eighth, runners reached third only to die as the result of strikeouts or tight fielding. The Rourkes' hits were scattered, not two being made in the same inning, while walks were almost an unknown quantity.

Omaha was unable to reach Kinisella in the second battle. In the first five rounds not a hit was registered. Only three men got to first in that time one each on an error, a walk and hit by pitcher. Clozman's greatest trouble was wildness. He walked nine men.

Omaha got into trouble right at the start. Her main difficulty was passing batters with the bases full. This was done in both the first and second rounds. Hahn opened with a double, Hunter walked and Thomas dropped the ball on Reilly's grounder, Hahn scoring.

Breen's walk, forced in a second score with the bases still filled, Clozman fanned and Hales' error, and Burrell was down on the strike out route.

The second inning was even but disastrous. Hahn beat out a bunt, Hunter was hit by the pitcher and Reilly and Breen walked. Singles by Jones and Ewaldt and Hales' double completed the quartet of tallies.
