MOYER'S TRIAL GOES OVER AT REQUEST OF STATE

Houghton, Mich., June 30.—O. N. Hillton, attorney for the Western Federation of Miners, agreed today to a postponement of the trial of Charles H. Moyer and other officials and members of the union. It was announced here today that the charges of conspiracy growing out of the recent strike of copper miners were to have been heard in the district court at Lansing on July 6. Because of the absence of witnesses the prosecution was unwilling to proceed and it is expected that the change in program will be approved by Judge O'Brien. The exact date to which the trial will be postponed was not given out.

LIND'S ACTS COME TO LIGHT

REPUBLICANS SANCTIONED
