FINAL RACE COMES SATURDAY

Harvard's 'Time in Contest with Winnipeg is Lowest This Year and Has Been Exceeded but Three Times.

HANLEY ON THAMES, July 1 .- The coveted grand challenge cup comes to America. Two American eight-oared crews-the

Union Boat club of Boston and the Harvard university second crew-were left to fight tomorrow for its possession by victories today in the semi-final heats over Winnipeg and Mayence, respectively. Both were most exciting races rowed in almost record time and won only after a hard struggle near the finishing line in each instance.

Wet weather and a strong wind did not cause either of the American crews to vary their almost perfect oaramanship, which has called forth the admiration of English experts.

The race between Harvard and Winnepeg, which came first, was a hard one and resulted in the best time recorded


