ROURKES DEFEAT DRUMMERS

Omaha Gets Lead that Missourians Are Unable to Overcome.

FINAL SCORE IS SEVEN TO THREE

Heavy Hitting on the Part of Pa's Sterlings and Errors of Home Team Give Visitors the Edge.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 3.—(Special Telegram.)—Playing in rejuvenated form behind Grover, Pa Rourke's no-hit art, the Rangers had little difficulty in winning the second game of the series from St. Joseph, 7 to 3. Grover was in excellent form, holding the Drummers powerless. Half the hits registered off his delivery were of the infield variety.

Three pitchers, including Outfielder Ned Pettigrew, were thrown into the breach by John Holland in an effort to stem the victory, but with no success. Ned was a pitcher when he first branched out in base ball, but his performance today leads one to believe that he is a better outfielder. He was touched for a two-bagger and a single and yielded a wild pitch, one run being scored off his delivery.

The Rourke scored five in the third inning, although but two hits were counted against Pettigrew. Crosby led off with a base on balls, but was forced at second when Grover attempted to sacrifice. Thomason singled, putting the pitcher on the throw to third. Dunlop was passed and Krug tripled, scoring three runs. Krug counted when Williams dropped Thomason's fly. Thomason took second and scored on an error by Rip Watson.

In the sixth Ward singled and stole second. Schipke walked and Crosby singled, scoring Ward. Ward doubled in the eighth, took third on a wild pitch and counted on Crosby's single.

The Drummers started a rally in the eighth, but were unable to go very far. Rip Watson led off with a double and Fox was passed. George Watson followed with a two base hit which scored both men and took third on a wild pitch, but Patterson, Britton, and Williams were easy outs.

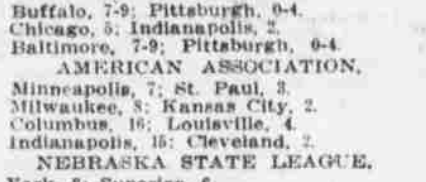
