Air and Submarine Craft Making Large - Warships Obsolete

BERLIN, JULY 4 .- A view recently expressed by the British admiral, Sir Percy Scott, that the development of sub marines and hydroplanes made dreadnoughts and large cruisers obsolete has caused much discussion in German naval. circles. So far as their public utterances go, German naval experts unanimously reject Admiral Scott's view.

The German Fleet society has pro nounced itself decidedly against it, and now Admiral von Breusing has published an article taking the same position. He admits that the submarine has recently made great progress and now exceeds the hopes that were at first held for it; and he also admits that the means of protection against the submarine had not been developed at an equal pace. Nevertheless the submarine's range of activity is a limited one. Even if it should put the dreadnoughts out of commission shore-waters, the latter would still be needed for operations on the high seas, where as yet, nebody expects that the aubmarine can venture owing to its con-
