The large handlers of cash wheat, not at Chicago, but in the southwest, claim they are un-able to fill the orders held by them, owing to the tightening grip on the new crop-being held by the producers. This is the case not only in the winter wheat country but the small surplus in the northwest is being held for higher prices. When the fact is considered that this country has a promiser of 900,000 bushels of wheat, and of this amount 680,000,000 are credited to the winter wheat states, it would seem that there would be more wheat than could possibly be taken care of. It must not be forgotten that foreigners are in need of the surplus wheat in this country and that they have bought a great deal more wheat in further ing the same period.
