**TEN DAYS YET FOR FILING**

Number of Districts in State Where No Republican Has Declared.

**TEN ARE SENATORIAL DISTRICTS**

Nineteen Are Representative Districts—In All There Are Some Where Excellent Chance for Republican Exists.

LINCOLN, July 9.—(Special.)—July 10 is the last day for which filings can be made for nomination at the primary. A perusal of the records in the office of the secretary of state shows that there are still twelve senatorial districts in which republicans have made no filings for the state senate, and only ten days are left.

These districts are as follows: District 2, composed of Saunders and Searcy, represented in the last session by E. E. Peck, democrat. District 5, Washington and Dodge, represented last session by George F. Wols, republican. District 7, Cumins, Pierce and Wayne, represented last session by Phil Kohl, democrat. District 10, Macdon, Stanton and Colfax, represented last session by Fielden J. Hale, democrat. District 11, Platte, Polk and Merrick, represented last session by Charles Krumbach, democrat. District 12, Seward and Butler, represented last session by William H. Smith, democrat. District 17, York and Hamilton, represented by Joshua Cox, democrat. District 18, Hall, Howard and Greeley, represented by Raymond E. West, democrat. District 21, Harlan, Furnas, Gompers and Phelps, represented by J. M. Grace, democrat. District 22, Buffalo, Sherman and Kearney, represented by Peter West, democrat. District 24, Boyd, Holt, Garfield, Wheeler, Keya Pahra, represented by John A. Robertson, democrat. District 26, Frontier, Red Willow, Hitchcock, Hayes, Dundy, Perkins and Chase, represented by John F. Cordell, republican.

**More Moosers File For the Legislature**

LINCOLN, July 9.—(Special.)—As George W. T. W. Lanigan of Greeley files for the democratic nomination for representative from the Fifty-second district, composed of the counties of Greeley, Wheeler and Garfield, represented in the last session by Richard McCarthy, a democrat.

**FORM NEW INSURANCE COMPANY**

LINCOLN, Neb., July 9.—(Special.)—Charles W. Sears of South Omaha has sent in his filing as a candidate for the nomination for attorney general on the republican ticket.

Mr. Sears is a member of the state tax commission, and has a law office in the city of South Omaha.

Up to this filing Deputy Attorney General George W. Ayers had no opponent for the nomination.

**LAST OF CIVIL WAR NAVAL HEROES TO GO.**

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Rear Admiral William H. H. Southernland, the last officer of the United States navy now on the active list who served during the civil war, will be retired July 10, when he becomes 62 years of age. That is the age fixed by congress for resignation to the retired list of all officers of the navy and below the rank of rear admiral.

**Highwaymen Hold Up Big Gang of Tramps**

FAIRBURY, Neb., July 9.—(Special.)—Two tramps, a negro and a white man, held up seventy-five hoboes in the woods across the river near the Rock Island bridge, last night, and relieved them of \$75. The hoboes were engaged in a poker game when the two tramps appeared on the scene and incidentally remarked: "Guess we will hold up the bunch. Throw up your hands."

The white man gathered in the money, while the negro kept guard on the tramps. The holdups then disappeared into the timber and it is alleged they took the Rock Island railroad to Thompson.

Considerable excitement prevailed among several hundred tramps who were staying in the woods. Fairbury has been infested with an army of hoboes for the last week. They style themselves "tourists" or "harvest hands."

A year ago tonight sixty-five hoboes took possession of a Rock Island freight train at the little town of Janes, six miles northwest of Fairbury. The train crew attempted to put them off and a battle ensued, resulting in several tramps being injured.

**Law of Mastodon Found at Upland**

UPLAND, Neb., July 9.—(Special.)—While excavating for the new Upland school building yesterday, Elmer Bunger found a lower jaw of a mastodon, a fossilized bone with ten teeth ranging in size from 2 3/4 inches to 4 3/4 inch. The bone crumbled up on removal from the yellow clay in which it was found, but the teeth are in perfect condition. This is the first specimen of the kind found in this locality.

He was last seen on the station platform at Hartington late Saturday night shortly before the arrival of the train for Laurel. His father has offered \$100 reward for information as to his whereabouts. No reason is known why he should leave home.

District 37, Chase, Perkins and Hayes, represented by Fred Hoffmeister, democrat. District 38, Sheridan and Box Butte, represented by Earl D. Mallory, republican. District 39, Dawson and Sioux, represented by H. E. Reische, democrat. District 40, Keith, Lincoln and Dawson, represented by E. M. Searle, Sr., republican.

**What Outlook Is.**

Ten of the twelve senatorial districts not yet represented by filings on the republican ticket were represented by democrats at the last session. At least seven of these are republican districts and if the right man files he ought to be elected.

Sixteen of the representative districts of the nineteen in which there is no republican filing were represented by democrats in the last session. At least eight of these should elect a republican to the lower house.

Before the meeting of the republicans in state conventions the time will have passed in which filings can be made. It would seem according to republicans here, that there ought to be a chance for somebody to get busy and see that an effort is made to get the right sort of men to file. If the two state chairmen are too busy getting things ready for the big convention the national committeeman from Nebraska ought to take interest enough in the republican party and the redemption of the state to make some effort to get these districts represented on the republican ticket.

**LOVELL GIVES SELF UP UPON SHOOTING CHARGE**

YORK, Neb., July 9.—(Special Telegram.)—Dr. Roy Lovell, a local veterinary and horse trader, this morning gave himself up to the sheriff. He is charged with carrying concealed weapons and shooting at Edward Ashley to wound. The affray started over a horse trade in a livery barn at Bradshaw on June 30. Lovell was arraigned before Judge Wray and bound over in the sum of \$500 for a preliminary hearing July 23.

The water is high on account of recent rains and the current took him down. He had been working for Ira Shilley about four miles from here. His body was recovered this forenoon and taken to Curtis where his mother now lives.
