BAILEY BEQUEST HELPS Y. M. C. A. AT KEARNEY

A bequest of \$1850 by the late Dr. W. L. Camp of Kearney, to the Young Men's Christian association of that town, will make possible the erection of a fine \$50,000 building there within a year, according to State Secretary J. P. Bailey. Dr. Samuel W. McGrew of Auburn was another Nebraska man who appreciated the work of the association. When he died, he directed that a sum be given annually to the association's state committee for a period of five years, and that a lump sum be given at the end of that time as a permanent endowment.
