CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—War development folted provision prices down almost as hard totay as wheat had been rushed up temporarily on account of the excitement over the first outbreak of hostilities. Loasses in value of provisions at the end of trading today ran from 57% to \$1.75 as compared with Saturday night. Stoplage of lard exports to Europe was immediately responsible, coupled with the tightening of finances. Corn fell with provisions, the September delivery closing 3% down. Other options of corn dropped only % to %c. Wheat declined %c to 1% c net and oats %c to 1% c. Although first transactions had shown hardly any wider differences in quotations for packing house products than have often occurred without attracting much notice, the lard market soon gave evidence of usual pressure, and in a short while was down nearly a dollar. Meanwhile pork and ribs also began to collapse, and before the end of the day the pork market was even more demoralizing than lard which, however, continued to fall until near the end of the session when something of a rally ensued. Net declines were:

Pork, \$1.75; lard, \$5c\$ to \$1.12%, and ribs.
