date of August 5:

"Have very little money except foreign. They won't accept foreign money and all banks are closed for three days. Great excitement here and strong anti-German feeling."

"It's fearful. Thousands of Americans are stranded without a cent. I had to borrow 5 shillings to pay bus fare about London and I put up a 50-franc note to borrow that 5 shillings. Foreign money is no good and the banks are closed for four days. The Hamburg-American, North German Lloyd and all German line steamship offices are closed. London is a wonderful city, but it's not in it with New York."

"Good in line for two hours at the American Express office to get money, but all we could get was \$20 for each person. Sight-seeing is going on just the same, however, and we will leave today for Stafford-on-Avon to attend the Summer School of Folk Song and Dance. If we don't sail August 15 on the Arabia we will come home on a battleship."
