But for two things, Pa Rourke's ambitious assembly of noble athletes might have copped two ball games from the spasmodic Bruins before the flock of customers who paid their way to Pa's ball yard yesterday. In the first place Messrs. Tipple and Styles pitched the pill where it could be hit. In the second place the Omaha hitters failed to connect with the proper amount of accuracy, precision and strength. Those two fatal mistakes beat out athletes and the Bruins added two more, 8 to 1, and 7 to 2, respectively.

The Bruins opened on Daniel Tipple, the well known pulebriculous athlete, in the opening stanza, and continued to batter his handsome countenance during the second and third rounds. 'Twas cruel to spoil the good looks of Daniel, but Jack Coffey and his hired hands have little respect for anybody since they dropped from first place. Two runs were counted off Daniel in each of the aforementioned rounds. Two more were added in the seventh to make the total eight. Mr. Edgington, the well known boy orator, who has been suffering from tonsillitis, was the chief disturber yesterday. He knocked four hits which sent two runs over the platter and scored three himself. The boy orator could have won the game all by himself, but he graciously permitted his mates to take a hand in the doings.

Styles Favors Mediation. In the second fray the Bears knocked two over in the fourth, and in the sixth treated Red Styles to an example of the kind of warfare that is in progress across the Atlantic ocean. Having experienced the sight of his own gore flowing around Rourke's park, Red is full of sympathy for the brave soldiers in Europe and intends to enlist in the diplomatic corps immediately and urge instant mediation. In the meantime the local lads were continuing in the even tenor of their way. They politely stepped aside in favor of their guests and never so much as even seemed belligerent. Pa ought to employ Kaiser Bill as manager so that they might put up a little fight now and then.

Empire Vanishes. One conspicuous element of the ball yard was absent yesterday. That was the regular umpire, Mr. Stockdale, the gent assigned to the series, failed to put in an appearance. His negligence is something of a mystery. Johnny Bonding, Congalton, Graham, Coffey and others, upon inquiry, declared they were unfamiliar with his whereabouts. But a perceptible grin proved that they and their own ideas on the matter. A good guess is that Mr. Roy Crab took over the umpiring. DE PALMA WINNER; WISHART IS KILLED

Wealthy Young Philadelphia Driver's Car Crashes Into Fence and Turns Over.

HIS MECHANICIAN MAY DIE

John Wentner Probably Fatally Injured as Result of the Accident.

GOING EIGHTY MILES AN HOUR

Race at Elgin Free-for-All, with Twenty-Four Starters.

SEVENTY-THREE-HALF FASTEST

Fallen in Second Place, with Old-field Third, Morris Fourth and Hearne Fifth—Mulford Relieves Chandler.

ELGIN, Ill., Aug. 22.—The Elgin national road race, which like that of yesterday was won by Ralph De Palma, developed into a tragedy. Spencer Wishart, the wealthy young Philadelphia driver and a bricoleur of only two months, meeting his death. His mechanic, John C. Jenter, a New Jersey boy, was probably fatally injured.

Wishart was leading the race, closely pressed by Burman. He was driving with his accustomed indifference to danger at an estimated rate of eighty miles an hour. In trying to pass a machine ahead of him on the thirteenth lap the hub of the two machines came together. Wishart's machine crashed into a fence and turned over, pinning him beneath it. His right leg was broken, his skull fractured and his chest crushed. He was hurried to St. Joseph's hospital, where he died in the presence of his bride, who until two months ago, was Miss Louis McGowan of the wealthy Indianapolis family of that name.

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Cars Do Not Halt

Jenter was thrown from the car back on the track 100 feet from where the car overturned. Militiamen dragged him from the course out of the way of other machines which were not halted by the tragedy. He also was taken to the hospital, where it was said tonight that his chance of recovery was slight. His right arm was broken and he suffered internal injuries. Four spectators were slightly injured, most in the way of bruises when the car hit the fence.

A dinner which was to have been given the drivers in Chicago tonight was cancelled and the accident cast a cloud over De Palma's remarkable performance.

Yesterday this driver beat the field over the 80-mile course at an average speed of 73.5 mile. This was a race for cars of 400 cubic inches displacement or under Free-for-All.

Today's race was a free-for-all with twenty-four starters. Only five of them were figuring in the race at the close and again De Palma was ahead, his average speed being 73.5 miles an hour or one and one-tenth of a mile slower than his previous performance, which was a new record for the course. Wishart's luck began yesterday. He was leading for most of the race until a leak developed in his gas tank and put him out of it.

Sixty thousand persons witnessed the race. The finish was as follows: Chandler was taken sick while at the wheel and was relieved by Mulford.

Uncle Sam Need Not Worry About Yankee Showing at Berlin

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Should there be such a thing as an international athletic clash at Berlin two years hence, Uncle Sam will not need to worry a single bit about the showing his sons will make in the 400-meter Olympic championship which is just short of our regular quarter-mile distance. With Rod Meredith of the University of Pennsylvania and Tom Halpin of the Boston Athletic association at first stringers, and a small host of coming youngsters capable of getting inside of fifty seconds, the United States is indeed well prepared to maintain its supremacy in the "quarter."

Quite the most promising of the young quarter-milers in America is a colored lad from Richmond, Va., named Binga Diamond, who now represents the University of Chicago. It was this boy who won the "400" championship at the western college conference meet, looking over his shoulder in 68th seconds. Western athletic critics state without reserve that Diamond is another John R. Taylor as regards his ability on the cinder path and they maintain that his performance at the conference games was not the limit of his capability over the quarter-mile distance by any means.

Diamond is an orphan. His father was a physician in Richmond and his mother was the daughter of a prominent colored clergyman in the south. Before going to the University of Chicago, Diamond attended the Richmond Union university, a Baptist school for colored boys, for some years, and it was here that he first showed signs of becoming a cinder-path star.

Diamond is a freshman at the University of Chicago and under the conference rules he can represent his university for three more years.
