SCHOOL AND COLLEGE WORK

Spokane High School Moves for Longer Hours.

LESS OUTSIDE STUDY IS PLANNED
One More Study Period at School is Provided Under New Arrangement—Other Educational Activities.

Meeting the demand for less study outside of the school room, the Spokane Board of Education has decided to lengthen the hours of attendance in the high schools three-quarters of an hour. Commencing in September the high schools will convene at 8:30 a. m. instead of 9, as formerly, and will close at 2:45 p. m. instead of 2:30. In a statement regarding the change Superintendent Bruce M. Watson said: "This schedule provides for seven school periods per day instead of six, as formerly. It does not contemplate more subjects or heavier programs for pupils, nor generally for teachers. The seven-period system makes possible a school program caring for the numerous activities of a complex high school organization to better advantage than the six-period plan. It also enables a pupil to choose his program to better advantage. The new plan gives every pupil one more period for study in school under conditions better for study than most homes afford, and also affords better opportunities for consultation between pupils and teachers."

Church Smiley of Shubert, Neb., has been chosen to act as private secretary for Chancellor Oeschger the coming year. Mr. Smiley will be in the university as a student. He comes with considerable experience to his credit, both as a teacher and a bookkeeper in a bank. The work in the chancellor's office has been increasing so that additional help was needed.

Chancellor Oeschger spent Friday night in Peru, and Sunday at Severance, Kan. Tuesday night he will lecture at Burchard. He will make short visits at Fall City and Salina, Neb., while on this trip.

Prof. Milo Keith, who was compelled to give up teaching for a year on account of illness, has so far recovered as to be able to take up his work again this year. He will teach Greek. He is spending his vacation at the present time at Northfield, Minn.

Chancellor and Mrs. Oeschger entertained Mrs. H. G. Wilkinson and daughter, Mrs. W. C. W. at a 5 o'clock dinner Wednesday evening. Miss Wanona will leave in a week for China. She will sail on the steamship Siberia. Her destination is Nankin, where she will teach English in a girl's school the coming year.

ST. THOMAS COLLEGE.
Only Catholic Military School in the United States.

The College of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minn., has the distinction of being the only Catholic military college in the United States. With a view to combining with all the best in military schools the college authorities introduced nine years ago the distinctive features of schools organized on the West Point plan. The results have abundantly justified the wisdom of the innovation. The moral and religious training is in the hands of priests, who are set apart for the work and devote their entire time and attention to it. The military training, covering not only the systematic physical development of the students, but also the cultivation of habits of promptness, obedience to orders, neatness and good manners, is in the hands of an officer of the United States army detailed by the secretary of war for work exclusively in the college. As the military system is based on honor and demands a high sense of honor, it is admirably adapted to develop an exceptionally fine type of character.

The new armory, which is now in course of construction, and will be ready for occupancy in September, emphasizes the remarkable growth of the college. Fourteen years ago a single building constituted the college; today six modern, commodious buildings, erected at a cost of nearly \$600,000, afford ample accommodations for the students who throng to the college from upwards of eighteen states. With the erection of each building came an increase in attendance. Last year 678 students were registered. The training of this splendid body of students was committed to the charge of thirty-two professors, priests and laymen, chosen under Archbishop Ireland's direction for the great work of the college which he founded and fostered.

The college has four departments. The college proper offers a four-year course leading to the Bachelor's Degree of Arts, Science and Philosophy. The academic department presents all the studies of a well equipped high school. In the department of commerce a training is given in the various branches of business, special attention being paid to thoroughness and accuracy. The students of this department have each year the advantage of a series of lectures given by the most successful men in the professional and business world of St. Paul and Minneapolis. The primary department is organized to meet the needs of young boys and of those who, through some defect in their previous training, are not qualified to enter on academic or commercial studies.
