Perhaps the most important news affecting the wheat market was the announcement that world shipments were virtually all from North America and for the most part were made up of wheat that had been grown in the United States. Most of the wildness in wheat was right at the start. Speculators were nearly unanimous in taking at once to the buying side. Before the session ended they were loined by flour manufacturers who were said to have received a limited minmber of export orders on the basis of takin before loading. On a second strong swell the September delivery touched the extreme high point of five days ago. The later months were lightly about of pre-vious high quotations.

In spite of the fact that all other markets reported stronger prices, the local trade opened very dull. Both shipper and killer buyers were of the opinion that prices at this point were entirely too high, and they proceeded to hold things down. In fact, shipper and speculator buyers failed to get in at all, and the whole of the supply was left at the disposal of the packers.

During the earlier rounds buyers even refused to make an offer on anything except the best hogs, and when they finally started bidding prices were no more than steady with the general market Saturday. One packer picked up two or three leads of hogs that just auited him at prices that were quoted at Sgiloc higher, paying as high as Shi for good quality butchers. Other buyers falled to better their bids to any great extent, though, and, after holding out until nearly il o clock, sellers started to cut loose at prices that were steady to a nickel higher, the big end of the hogs selling on this basis.

Towards the close the slumpy feeling which had been in evidence all morning, became more noticeable, and prices weakened, dropping first to a steady hasis, and a little later to a somewhat lower level. Sales made at this time were in no instance more than steady with Saturday, while a number of them were quoted as being in some cases a dime lower.

Bulk of the sales were made at Sales 300, against Saturday's 18 5009 00 trade. There was a sprinkling around \$2.5509 10, and tope reached \$2.55, a nickel higher than the highest figure paid Saturday.
