SCHOOL TEACHERS ASSIGNED

Where the Various Instructors Are to Be Located This Year.

MANY CHANGES ARE MADE

Superintendent Graff Tells Teachers to Consider European War "Without Prejudice" and to Reserve Judgment.

With a single exception, all of the nearly 700 school teachers of Omaha reported for duty at the general meeting at the Central High school auditorium, where the assignments were read.

The exception was Miss Marie Wetzel of Saunders school, who is warbound somewhere in Europe. No word has been received from her for several days.

"She was probably held up at the Swiss border," said Miss Ethel Lynn, the last teacher to arrive from Europe. "She took train for Germany after the order had been issued forbidding strangers to cross the border. Had she been in some of the larger cities she would have communicated with some of her friends."

Superintendent E. U. Graff addressed the teachers at the High school auditorium. He urged them to consider the great European war "without prejudice" and to reserve judgment until further facts justified some conclusion.

Referring to the beginning of school and the work of the teachers, Superintendent Graff said: "In one sense teachers are not compensated for the work they do. It would be impossible to arrive at any proper remuneration for the services they render. Their salaries therefore are much in the nature of an honorarium, a gratuity.

"The schools, it has been charged, have been the home of fads. Looking backward we realize that the schools have followed after many wild-the-winds. Today, however, the tendency is to make the school practical. Care must be exercised that this tendency does not in turn become the ruling purpose of the schools, for the main purpose of education would then be thwarted.

"We cannot put too much stress upon the question of the spirit with which we approach our work. We have no patience with any one who works by routine, by schedule, day by day, thinking only of the hours spent as so much money earned."

POSTOFFICE CLERKS HERE

Open Their Annual Convention at the Rome Hotel.

MANY ACCOMPANIED BY WIVES

Men Go to the Den This Evening. While the Women Will Be Guests at the Orpheum Theater.

It was a surprising crowd that gathered for the first morning session of the fifteenth annual convention of the United National Convention of Postoffice Clerks at the Hotel Rome yesterday.

Over 200 clerks were enrolled, and these, with the many wives and daughters, who attended with the delegates, almost filled the convention hall.

Mayor James C. Darbonne, Postmaster John C. Wharton, E. J. Payne and George Kleffner delivered addresses of welcome. President Frank T. Rogers of Chicago delivered his address, admonishing the various committees to get to work early on their reports, and the meeting adjourned for the day.

Postoffice Federation. President Rogers, in his address pointed out that the association has some 30,000 members and that its purpose is solely to increase the efficiency of the service. He referred to the old session in the association, when many of the members stepped out and joined the American Federation of Labor. He praised the Federation of Labor for its efficiency and for the good it had wrought, but was in favor of a separate organization of postoffice clerks. In regard to the proposition that has several times been advanced for a referendum vote to determine whether the clerks' association or whether the whole association should bodily go into the fed-

eration, he said: "They have not cared to meet our proposition of the referendum for some reason or other. So far as I am concerned, as long as I am president of the association I shall obey your edicts. I'll not make any compromise with the devil."

Hoper Not Present. First Assistant Postmaster General Hoper was invited to attend the convention. He sent his regrets, saying that he could not be present on account of the stress of business at Washington. Congressman W. L. Riley, champion of the eight-hour law, had also been invited. He sent a lengthy communication, saying that in account of the condition of business in the House of Representatives at this time he could not come. "I had expected to go, whether invited or not," he said. "I will say that as long as you have a man like your president, Frank P. Rogers, to represent your interests at Washington you will always be assured of a respectful hearing."

Montenegrins Win Victory Over Austrians. ROME, Via London, Sept. 7.—A despatch from Cetina to the Messagero says Montenegrins troops under command of General Vukotich, the war minister, have defeated the Austrians at Bolanitz, in Herzegovina, capturing all their munitions of war and the commissariat. The Austrians are said to have left a large number of dead and wounded on the field.

"General Vukotich," the despatch adds, "drove the Austrians back toward Cetina, where he made a triumphant entry. The town had been pillaged and portions of it were in flames."

"Savage" fighting continues. The Montenegrins are engaging a superior number of Austrians and endeavoring to occupy Grahovo.

Four Fremont Men Hurt in Auto Upset. FREMONT, Neb., Sept. 7.—Four Fremont young men were injured when an automobile in which they were driving to the Snyder carnival upset three miles this side of Snyder late last night. The injured are:

Tom Fleming, chest and abdomen crushed, may die. Ed Clark, fingers broken, chest crushed. Perry Smith, ribs and collarbone broken, lungs punctured, serious. Ray Losey, lower limbs paralyzed. Losey is a son of former Representative George Losey.

Guns Made Near Liege by Germans. LONDON, Sept. 7.—A dispatch to the Chronicle, from Amsterdam says that the Germans are preparing to reopen immediately the gun factories at Cockeril near Liege. These factories, covering 35 acres, were one of the richest prizes captured by the Germans in the war.

The whole concern has been taken over by the Prussian war office, which has offered the Belgian workmen 50 per cent increase in wages to remain at their posts.
