LAST TWO GAMES TO OMAHA

Kaws Succumb to Slants of Roy Crabb and Ralph Willis. FINAL COMBATE OF SEASON Fred Thomas Makes Last Pateout on Local Lot and Rourke Departs for Twelve-Game Trip on Road.

Top tried and true athletes out of the band of fourteen Rourke's, who have survived the terrific warfare of the Western league this summer, surrounded the Kaw forces yesterday afternoon at Rourke park, blew up the ammunition train and literally annihilated the Kansas troops in two frays, 2 to 0, and 1 to 1. Those ten tried and true warriors were fighters of first water yesterday and they proved they were well equipped to protect the honor of this marvelous municipality.

While out of an army of fifty-seven, forty-three have been cut down by the enemy or captured, the gallant little band fighting for Omaha yesterday, to use an old and hackneyed expression, ring down the curtain on Western league baseball for the season of 1914 in Omaha and have departed from our midst to wage a brief foreign campaign before hiking for the fringes, where they will spend the winter trying to borrow advance money from Hill Rourke to pay for the substances which are acknowledged the necessities of life.

The Cooley-less Kaw's yesterday were duck soup. The Kaw hurlers had a delicate propensity toward placing themselves in juxtaposition to trouble so to speak at crucial intervals. Ridgeway and Dasher were the gents who were so careless and they are now becoming two gents.

Crabb Heaves Profoundly. Roy Crabb, who once pastimed about Los Angeles and other places adjacent thereto, found the Kaw's duck soup. Two mealy little binties were all he permitted them and only once did a Kaw get as far as second - Forlorn and unhappy he was left helplessly stranded by his heartless mates. Two others were left in similar status at first base.

The Moose quartet dispensed mellifluous melodies at intervals and a couple of bugs aroused the ire of Bert Crover, thus inciting Grover to a state of wrath and arousing his pugilistic instinct. Luckily Bert believes in safety first and he carried on his private war with chatter similar to the Mexicans. Bert expects to be drafted by General Carranza in a couple of days and had a bunch a scout was watching him.

Thomas Makes Last Out. Fredy Thomas proved himself to be an adept and conscientious youth. He made the last out of the year by appearing a fly of Bill Rapps and instead of pocketing the sphere or heaving it over the grandstand by way of identification he loyally returned the pill to Johnny Goding, the well known custodian.

Dr. Payne, the well known veterinarian, was the chief knocker of the pastime. He completed five blows in the two games.
