FIGHT ON COMPENSATION LAW

State Federation of Labor Has Warm Debate Over Proposition.

DIFFER ON COMMITTEE REPORT

Final Action Will Be Taken Later, the Discussion Not Being Concluded-University Removal Is Favored.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Sept. 17 .- (Special Telegram.) -Though passing resolutions in condemnation of the workmen's compensation law in the committee Sesterday with only one dissenting vote, when the matter came up before the State Federation of Labor convention today it brought on a red hot discussion which developed much opposition to the report of the committee. After discussing it for most of the afternoon the resolution was laid over

until tomorrow when action will be taken. The federation declared in favor of removal of the university to the state farm. F. M. Coffey challenging the statements made that university students worked their way through school on the money made by working out of school hours.

"Most of thees students work on the outside for no other purpose than to earn money to keep up their end in the fraternities and the social functions," said Mr. Coffey.


Fredrick W. Wolf.


