Rourke Star Twirler Blanks Wichita in First Fray, but Is Hammered in Second.

WICHITA, Kan., Sept. 19.—(Special Telegram)—By winning the first game of a double-header here today Dan Tipple, Bourke's star twirler, accomplished his seventh straight victory. In essaying to make it eight even by pitching the second contest, the youngster fell down, Wichita getting away with the long end of a 10 to 3 score. The Omaha lad was invincible in the first game, holding the jobbers to three scattered hits, but two men reached second base. O'Rourke walked in the first and stole second and singled in the fourth and again stole. Slagle was pitching almost as good ball for Wichita and the only score to count was Thomason's home run in the fourth inning. The Rourkees missed a chance to count a second run by slow base running. In the eighth O'Rourke's error put Schleibner on and Seabaugh sacrificed. Tipple doubled to center, but Schleibner was thrown out at the plate on the relay from the fence. Thomas at short played a star game for Omaha and Rapp featured in the field for Wichita. Next Fatal for Tipple. 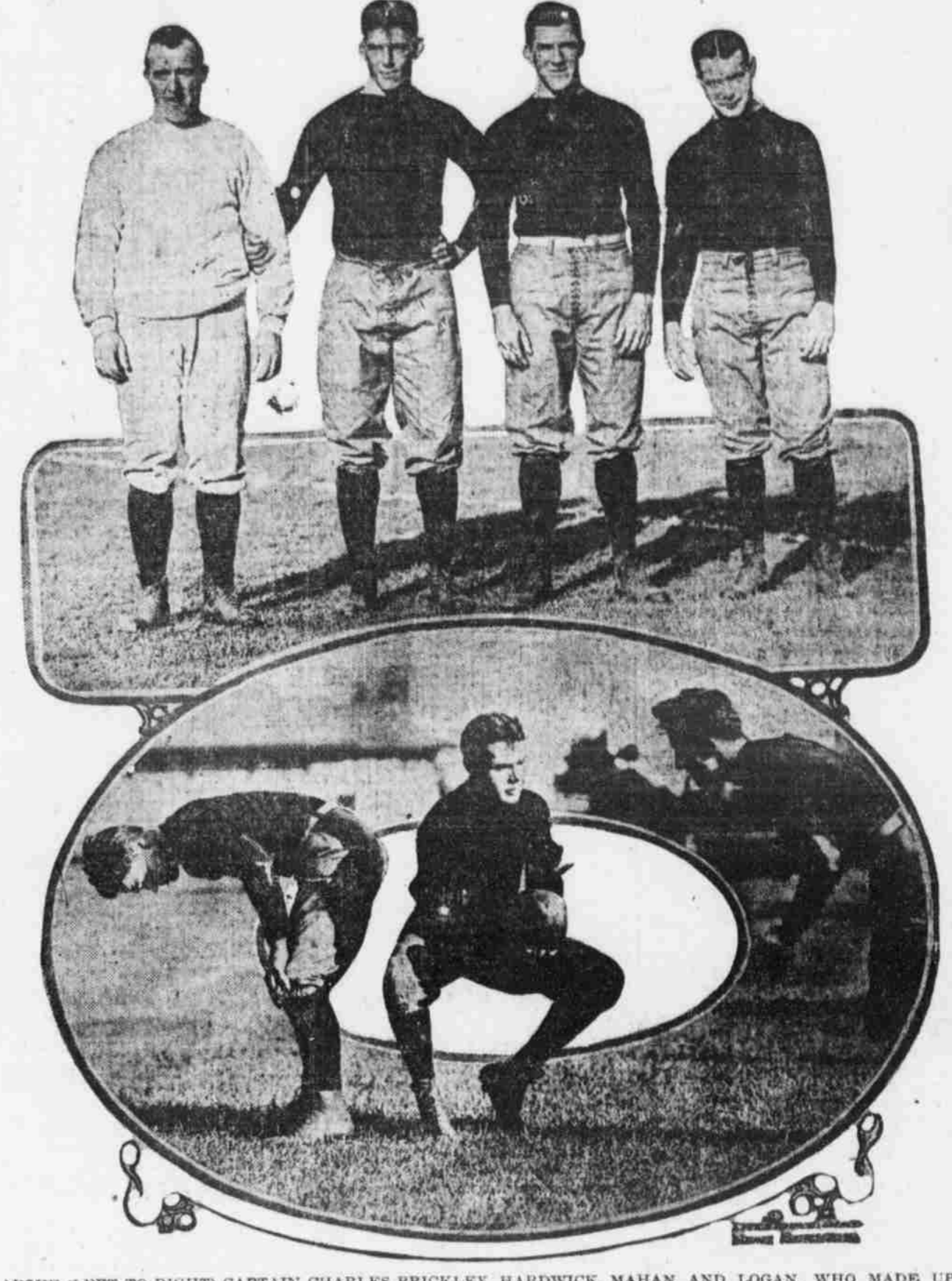
Governor Toner, National League President, and His Wife Among Spectators Seeing the Contest.
