Wheels of Frisco to Stop on Day of Fire Anniversary

Every wheel in San Francisco will stop for two minutes on Sunday, April 18, 1914, during the Panama-Pacific International exposition on Commercial club day. At 1 o'clock the bells of the city will ring and the suspension of all business and traffic will be as a silent thanksgiving for the recovery from the disaster of April 18, nine years previous. Special service will be held in all the churches, the exposition, downtown auditorium and Festival hall.

HARVARD CLUBS CHARTER STEAMER TO GO TO FAIR

The Associated Harvard clubs have chartered the Red Star line steamer Kronland, to bring members and their families to San Francisco for their nineteenth annual meeting in August, 1915, the trip to be made through the Panama canal. The American Druggist syndicate also has chartered a special excursion steamer to bring delegates to its meeting at the exposition in the early summer.

INSIDE INN AT FRISCO UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Work was started on "The Inside Inn," to be built just inside the horticultural boundary wall of the Panama-Pacific International exposition. The company that is building this structure is incorporated for \$1,500,000 and the inn will be complete in every detail that the modern hotel can offer and in addition will have many community features not found in the hostelry.

THREE MILES OF RIBBON FOR LIVE STOCK PRIZES

A strip of ribbon two inches wide and three miles in length will be used by the department of live stock of the Panama-Pacific International exposition in the badges to be given the winners in the various classes. These are in addition to the \$60,000 already set aside for live stock prizes and not including \$27,000 to be given in purses at the two racing meets for harness horses.

BIG TOY SOLDIER, NINETY FEET IN AIR, AT FRISCO

The biggest toy soldier in the world will be seen at Frederic Thompson's "Toyland Grow-Up," at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. He will be ninety feet tall, and will stand at "attention," at "shoulder arms." In full dress uniform, with akako and all, making a companion figure to the huge autograde already nearly completed.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. Warren Davis. The brother returned a few days ago, while Miss Davis was stopping in New York to visit. They were in Switzerland when the war started.

Back From Insurance Meeting—T. W. Blackburn and E. M. Martin have just returned from Asheville, N. C., where they attended the meeting of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. The meeting was largely attended by insurance attorneys and executives of insurance companies and associations. Lawson G. Bryan of Lincoln, insurance commissioner of Nebraska, was also present. Thirty-five states were represented by their insurance commissioners.

EXTENSION OF EXHIBIT SPACE GRANTED JAPAN

Japan has asked for increased exhibit space at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. The communication was from Acting Consul General Y. Nishino, who had authority from the government and Commissioner General Yamawaki. Application was made for 10,790 square feet of additional space in the palace of manufactures, and 1,700 square feet of additional space in the palace of food products. The application for the space in the palace of manufactures has been granted and this brings the total to 32,188 square feet for Japan. The original allotment for Japan in the palace of food products was 4,200 square feet.
